

Mark Lamping

Can you please tell us about your background?

I'm from St. Louis, born and raised there. I spent almost my entire life there. I worked for Anheuser-Busch when I got out of business school. I was fortunate enough to be named president of the St. Louis Cardinals. Anheuser-Busch owned the team at the time. That was back in 1994. In 2008, I left St. Louis and went to New York to head up a joint venture between the New York Jets and New York Giants that developed MetLife Stadium. I got that built and got it up and running, and then the opportunity came to join Shad Khan here in Jacksonville. I joined the Jaguars about a month after Shad purchased the team. I'm married and have three children. Two of our children have made their way to Jacksonville, and our oldest is still in St. Louis.

When you reflect on your career, do you have a favorite moment?

That's hard. I think probably one of the greatest moments I had is getting a call from August Busch III, who was the chairman of Anheuser-Busch. I was 36 years old at the time, and he offered me the job as president of the St. Louis Cardinals. I was born and raised in St. Louis. I grew up a Cardinal fan. It's still my favorite team. That was really, really significant. I think the opening of the new ballpark in St. Louis was another really important point as I look back over my career. Then later in that same year in 2006, the Cardinals won their 10th world championship so it was fun to be part of that. Similarly, the opening of MetLife Stadium was a wonderful milestone. Here in Jacksonville, I think our home playoff game last year against Buffalo. Not just the fact that it was a playoff game and not just the fact that we won. All the tarps were removed. We didn't have any tarps on the seats. Jaguar fans filled the stadium to capacity. They got in the stands early. They cheered throughout the game, and they made a big impact. The reason I think that's one of my highlights is, Jaguar fans really deserved that day. This has been a fanbase that has so loyally supported the team and in many respects, they've been unfairly criticized from outside the market. That was a great day. It was a day to show the entire country what Jacksonville really is, what the quality of the fanbase really is, versus what some outsiders have perceived.

What should fans of the Jaguars look forward to?

We are going to continue to evolve as an organization. Shad made the commitment early on that he's going to do everything necessary to have a financially stable, consistently competitive, championship NFL franchise. Jacksonville has some really good things about it, and there are some things that we struggle a bit on when we compare ourselves to other NFL markets. In order to achieve that goal, we're going to have to be creative. We can't necessarily follow the playbook that other teams might pursue. Our efforts will include continued investment, development of making sure the fan experience is as good as it possibly can be, investing in related businesses to help support our overall revenue structure and at the end of day, being a real catalyst in terms of delivering a downtown Jacksonville that can reach much closer to its full potential.



What's the future hold for the development of Jacksonville's Shipyards?

The plans are very ambitious. Our goal is to create a vibrant neighborhood in and around the sports complex where we have people who would be working, people who are living, in addition to all of the people who currently visit, and do it in a way that it can become a significant catalyst for further development in downtown Jackson-ville. Not only are we committed to the project, we are very, very optimistic that it will exceed everyone's expectations.

What's it like to be part of this culture shift with the Jaguars?

I'm very proud of the culture we have here at the Jaguars. It's based on mutual respect and mutual trust. We try to hire the best employees. We have a very diverse organization. We believe in giving people opportunities. We believe in giving people the resources that are necessary to achieve their goals. We think we're realistic in terms of what our expectations are and in return for that, our employees gladly accept accountability for results. I think we're very unified as a group. We have our ups and downs just like any organization. We really encourage people to make decisions, to be committed to achieving our goal of a stable franchise and knowing that as an organization, we're sensitive to their needs. We're really sensitive to what the work environment is like. We want our employees to have a quality of life that is very positive. We insist on a good work-life balance from all our employees. We hope that our employees believe that we care deeply about them because we do.

What do you enjoy most about living in Ponte Vedra Beach?

We live at the Plantation, so both my wife and I love to golf. We're very close to the beach, which we love. It's a very easy community to arrive in and very quickly feel welcome. The majority of us who live in Ponte Vedra aren't from the state of Florida. We've been fortunate enough and blessed to find our way to Ponte Vedra and call it our home. It's a great environment. But more than anything else, it's the quality of the people.



Building construction for the new Global Home of the PGA Tour is anticipated to begin this November.

PVARC approves materials for new Global Home of the PGA Tour

The Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley Architectural Review Committee unanimously approved the materials to be used in construction of the new Global Home of the PGA Tour on Tuesday, Aug. 21, allowing the organization to commence preparations for the next phase of the project.

"We couldn't have been more thrilled to get past that step," said Kirsten Sabia, vice president of integrated communications for the PGA Tour. "Our architect, Foster + Partners, presented and showed the myriad samples that we needed to get approved by the council, and that included the surface of the roof; the glass, which is a very big part of the building; the skylight material that we'll have — a number of things, and we actually brought in physical samples."

While preliminary work for the new headquarters — to be located off Palm Valley Road — began this summer, Sabia advised that construction of the building itself is anticipated to commence this November, with the overall project expected to be completed by late 2020.

Designed to blend in with its natural surroundings, the 187,000-square-foot building will be three stories tall and feature a contemporary style, with a flat roof, columns and outdoor decks and balconies made of wood.

"The roof will be a matte roof, and in fact, the roof panels will have the only applied color on the exterior of

the building, because a lot of it will be made with natural surfaces and glass," Sabia said. "The concrete that will be used for a lot of the main pillars will be as light as possible, because they're trying to resemble the sand of our beaches, and the windows they're trying to make a neutral gray, because that avoids unnecessary reflection — especially because there will be the water features that flank the building."

The material to be used for the skylight, Sabia added, is ETFE (ethylene tetrafluoroethylene), the same material that was used for the translucent roof of the Minnesota Vikings' new home, U.S. Bank Stadium.

"Each element that we got approved was representative of the palette that was really inspired by the landscape of Ponte Vedra in general," she explained. "We want to be in harmony with it, so that it feels like it fits within the nature of it all."

With THE PLAYERS Championship moving to March (to be held March 12-17) and the new headquarters being built in the tournament's usual spot for general parking, Sabia said the PGA Tour would continue to encourage fans to take advantage of ride-sharing services and the tournament's "four or more park for free" carpool vouchers.

"We will continue to have parking in the lot," she advised. "There will be a portion of it that will not be able to be used, because it will be in a construction zone ... but we'll just really be pushing those elements to alleviate for any lost spaces."

Ponte Vedra High School student completes **EXPLO Future of Medicine** program at Yale

Ponte Vedra High School student Madison Wood recently completed the EXPLO Future of Medicine program on the campus of Yale University.

Future of Medicine is a one-week intensive study of the complex and ever-changing landscape of medical careers in both traditional settings and associated medical fields.

At EXPLO Future of Medicine, students participated in case studies that dealt with ethical dilemmas; observation training that Yale medical students undertake as part of their coursework; an investigation using big data; and various simulations and discussions around health care policy, telemedicine and medical technologies. Students presented their data investigations to Dr. John Brownstein, Boston Children's Hospital's chief innovation

Students met with medical professionals including Dr. David Mulligan, Dr. Celine Gounder, Dr. Jason Lazar and Associate Director of Digital Health at the FDA Center for Devices and Radiological Health Bakul Patel, to learn about topics ranging from the future of medical school to research involving synthetic base-pairing to aid in treatment delivery, robotic surgery and

the role of the FDA in medical devices. Students also visited the New Haven

Department of Health and learned about the various components of public health while participating in a mock investigation of a reported illness. They also visited the Yale MRI Center to learn about the advances in MRI technology and its use in current medical practices and the possibilities it presents moving forward.

"Allowing students to explore a field in depth, through real life, handson experiences, all while interacting with peers and industry professionals, provides them an unparalleled opportunity to dive into an area of interest," said Moira Kelly, president of EXPLO. In this edition of Why I Serve, featuring Wounded Warrior Project, the Recorder sat down with Iraq War veteran Adam Bagby, who discussed his time serving in the U.S. Army as a military police officer, why he chose to enlist in the Army and more. Bagby, who now teaches world history at St. Augustine High School, served from 2001 to 2009. His first day of Advanced Individual Training was on the morning of the Sept. 11 terror attacks.

What was it like knowing you were going to war?

We were actually in a building learning about paperwork, sworn statements, and sure enough a drill sergeant's cell phone started going off. That's when they said, "Formation everybody, go outside." I was a squad leader at the time, and I said, "Listen, this is going to be a psychological test. Whatever is coming, just say, 'Yes, you're ready for war, that's what they want to hear so tell them what they want to hear." Sure enough, it ended up not being a psychological test. That was my


Sept. 11 We didn't have radio, or televisions or cell phones and I genuinely thought it was a test. At that time, whoever thought about America being attacked?

What was your primary role?

As a military police officer, we actually have a bunch of different hats that we wear. Our primary role is what everybody sees when you go up to the gate, that's called garrison — where we're actually either a gate guard or we provide personal security, or we just patrol and write tickets and eat donuts. There is truth to that. And then we had another hat where we were field MPs (military police) and that's where your job is really important. Not to say garrison's not but when you're field, that's when you go to Afghanistan and Iraq.

Why did you serve?

I guess you'd have to say it goes back to my family going all the way back through to Jamestown. My family first came over as indentured servants. All through time my family have been farmers, but they



would also wear their military hat so they served in the Revolutionary War and going back to the Spanish-American War all the way to the Civil War. My family has been in every military engagement throughout history. Then my generation comes up, my dad Vietnam, my grandfather World War II, my great grandfather was part of World War I and he was shot down three times and he managed to come home. But then it was me, my older brother Justin got injured in basic training, so my dad looked at me and said one of us has to serve. I'm like, "For tradition, for honor's sake, yes I will serve."

Ponte Vedra tops Nease in Battle of the Bridge

Sharks' second half proves too much for Panthers

Ponte Vedra came into last Friday night's football game against Nease owning an eight-game win streak in their rivalry. The Sharks found a way to win this year's Battle of the Bridge 35-14 despite two red zone fumbles and a missed extra point in the game's first 24 minutes.

A wildly enthusiastic, standing-roomonly crowd at Panther Stadium saw Ponte Vedra dominate the Aug. 24 game in almost every aspect, including a more than two-to-one advantage in time of possession. With Nease holding a 14-13 halftime advantage, the Panther faithful had high hopes of reclaiming the Bridge trophy. But 22 unanswered second half points for the Sharks would make the difference.

GAME RECAP

The Sharks, led by quarterback Jack Murrah and running back Mark Calvin, mounted an extended opening drive moving to a first down at the Nease 5-yard line. What the Panthers' defense could not stop, a Ponte Vedra fumble did. Nease took over in the shadow of their own goalpost and moved to their 30-yard line before punting the ball away.

Murrah moved his team from midfield to inside the Panthers' red zone, and once again the Sharks fumbled the ball away.


This time, Nease took advantage of the turnover. Panthers speedster Joe Bradshaw ripped off 40 yards, and then quarterback Preston Staples connected with Jeremy Killmer for 43 more and a touchdown as the first quarter expired.

Down 7-0, quarterback Cobi Myers took over for the Sharks and engineered a 71-yard drive. Myers hit on a pair of first down passes to Nick Pirris and Reese Russi, and then he ran for 21 yards before handing off to Calvin for the touchdown. Trouble continued for the Sharks when the point-after attempt hit off the left upright.

Ponte Vedra forced a three-and-out and Murrah came back in the game at quarterback. A 12-yard completion to Russi gave the Sharks a first down at midfield. Then a Murrah to Pirris toss was good for 15 more. Murrah then went to Kyle Barker for 15 yards and a touchdown. The Sharks led 13-7 with two minutes left in the half.


Nease, behind two outstanding broken field runs by Staples, was able put together a solid drive in the final minutes to regain the lead 14-13.

After the teams traded possessions to open the second half, disaster struck for the Panthers. Caden Fordham's punt pinned Nease inside the 20-yard line. On the next play, the Panthers fumbled the ball. Fordham scooped it up and raced into the end zone for the Sharks' third touchdown of the night. Coach Matt Toblin's prudent

decision to go for two was justified when Murrah sent Barker in motion to the right and lofted the ball to him alone at the goal line. The Sharks now led 21-14.





The Sharks once again have high hopes for another successful season despite the loss of several key players from the 2017 campaign.

One valuable component, however, remains in place at PVHS - head coach Matt Toblin. The popular, charismatic coach is in his fifth year at the helm of the Sharks, and he has high expectations of leading his 2018 team into the FHSAA playoffs for the fourth straight year.

While many schools across the country are struggling for numbers, that's not the case at Ponte Vedra. Some 140 players have reported for fall practice at the varsity and junior varsity levels, and much of the credit surely can be traced to Toblin.

In an era when many athletes are inclined to "concentrate" on one sport, that is certainly not the case at Ponte Vedra. As many as six starters will change their pads, cleats and long pants for shorts when the current football season concludes and basketball begins. Two players who made a huge impact in last Friday's season opening victory over Nease - senior Max Schalit and sophomore Parker Campbell - will remain on the field at Sharks Stadium as members of the PVHS lacrosse

Schalit, who had a monster game against Nease with three tackles for a loss, perhaps summed it up best following the rivalry game as to how players, both past and present, feel about their football coach.

"I wanted to play for Coach Toblin," said Schalit, who played in his first football game since his freshman year. "I knew he was a good coach, so I came out for football and I love it."

Always wearing his long sleeve blue shirt and tie - regardless of if it's a comfortable 72 degrees or a stifling hot 99 Toblin once again may have a team that is playoff-bound.

Although the Sharks have seen several starters depart through the graduation ranks - including offensive playmaker Jarrett Stepp and current West Point linebacker Duncan Van Kouteren - a number of talented players return for Ponte Vedra. As one could clearly see from Friday night's convincing victory over Nease, however, the team's biggest asset may be its depth in personnel.

We're fortunate in our program that we do have a lot of depth," Toblin said. "Our depth was a big reason why we pulled it out in the third and fourth quarter against Nease.'

The Sharks return five starters on defense — six if one could include a transfer from rival Nease, defensive lineman Josiah Haygood. Three-year starter Peter Merlini returns to bolster a defensive line that includes another returning starter from 2017, Emory Kingry.







Nease may have lost to rival Ponte Vedra on Friday night in the season opener for both teams, but the Panthers still have plenty of reason for optimism for the 2018 season.

Nease has returned nearly all of its starting offensive line and senior quarterback Preston Staples is returning as starter with a strong work ethic and dedication that impressed his coaches in the offseason.

"He played really well in the spring and played a solid game (against Yulee)," Nease coach Tim Krause said of Staples. "He's done a really good job this year and through the offseason and worked really hard, and did all the things we expected of him, so we're really excited for his senior year."

The Panthers still have some big shoes to fill in their run game. Standout running back Jareem Westcott, who rushed for 1,519 last season, is now at Stetson University.

Krause said while there are gaps to fill this year, he's proud of the team culture and his players' willingness to learn and work together.

"We have a really good group of seniors, and kids that have played a lot of football together, and kids that have been in our program for a long time," Krause said. "We really just worked on that and challenged them as a group and they did a great job and really rose to the challenge."

Nease will try to bounce back after its 35-14 loss to Ponte Vedra last Friday, but Krause said playing against other St. Johns County schools provides an exciting challenge.

"It's a really great atmosphere when we play each other," Krause said of playing county opponents, which include Ponte Vedra, Creekside (Sept. 21), St. Augustine (Oct. 19) and Bartram Trail (Nov. 2). "Those games are always really fun and games our kids look forward to."

Krause also said matchups in Class 6A District 4 are also increasingly difficult. The Panthers' district games this season are against White (Sept. 14), Middleburg (Oct. 12), St. Augustine and Englewood (Oct. 25).

cancer, the Coughlin family witnessed the physical, emotional and financial stress the illness caused for the McGillis family. As a result, Coughlin started the Jay Fund







Anthem protests continue to spark local and national debate

On Aug. 26, 2016 — a date which will live in NFL infamy — the San Francisco 49ers' then-quarterback Colin Kaepernick opted to sit out the traditional pregame performance of the national anthem while the rest of his team stood, hands over hearts. Claiming that his refusal to stand was in protest of "police brutality," Kaepernick's bold move of defiance would quickly spark a national movement and firestorm, and with the recent resurgence of the anthem protests during the 2018 NFL preseason, the fierce debate over the controversy, it seems, will rage on.

"The NFL players are at it again - taking a knee when they should be standing proudly for the National Anthem," President Donald Trump tweeted out Aug. 10, following the movement's revival during the Aug. 9 NFL preseason openers.

A vocal opponent of the protests from the beginning, the president went on to say that the players were protesting "something that most of them are unable to define," and that football games were "no place to protest."

Jacksonville Jaguars Telvin Smith, Leonard Fournette, T.J. Yeldon and Jalen Ramsey were among the Aug. 9 protestors, opting to stay in the locker room during the performance of the national anthem before their team's first preseason game against the New Orleans Saints.

"I've got beliefs," Smith said at the press conference following the Jaguars' 20-24 defeat. "I did what I did. I don't know if it's going to be every week, can't answer if it's going to be every week, but as a man, I've got to stand for something.'

Jaguars head coach Doug Marrone, however, offered a different opinion, stating, "I think I made it clear that, for me, I'm always going to stand with my hand on my heart, and I think that the people that don't, then they've got to answer to it, to the media."

And answer the protestors have not just to the media, but to the fans. On Facebook, a page entitled "Boycott Jacksonville Jaguars" has amassed nearly 2,000 followers, meanwhile some local restaurants, like Harbor Tavern in Atlantic Beach, have opted to stop showing NFL games altogether, "due to disrespect."

With the NFL and the NFL Players Association working to come to an agreement on what the proper anthem protocol should be, and with ESPN, among other networks, vowing to no longer air the tradition during its "Monday Night Football" broadcasts, Jacksonville-area residents have been just as divided on the issue.



Some, like St. Augustine resident Aaron Scott Jockers, have come to the defense of the protestors, arguing that they are simply exercising their constitutional rights.

"Protest is what this country was built on," Jockers told the Recorder via Instagram. "If people wish to draw attention to a problem in society, there is nothing more American than doing so."

Others, however, hold that it is disrespectful and an insult to America's military members to kneel or sit during the national anthem.

"If we all can't agree that you should


stand during the playing of the national anthem to honor those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice for our country, we have much bigger problems than we think," Chris Taylor contended via Facebook. "This should be a very basic and underlying value of each American."

Further, others have noted that the NFL is an employer with a reputation to protect, and maintain that the organization should be allowed to set guidelines for employee behavior.

"The NFL is privately owned and these players (are) 'on the clock," Stacy Lynn told the Recorder via Instagram. "I think it is wonderful that they can protest on national TV without fear of being imprisoned or harmed, (but) I think it is a terrible business choice. Anything that would offend half my customers would be cut immediately."

Lynn also added that she felt the players' decision to protest during the anthem was not an effective way to convey their

"Anytime I try to change someone's mind, the last thing I would do is attack and alienate them," she said, adding, "Their message has been long lost. Time to find a new method to communicate."







SALAMI PANINI WITH TOMATO-CHILI JAM (Makes 3 sandwiches)

Ingredients:

- 3 Italian crusty buns
- 1 package Black Kassel Old Forest, Picante, or Mustard Seed salami
- 1½ cups baby arugula
- 4 ounces semi-soft cheese, such as gouda or Hayarti, sliced
- 1/2 cup tomato-chili jam
- 2 tablespoons olive oil

Directions:

 Cut buns in half lengthwise. Layer salami slices on each bun; top with arugula and cheese slices. Spread tomato-chili jam generously on the inside of the top of each bun.

2. Heat oil in a large frying pan over medium heat. Place sandwiches in pan and place another large heavy pan on top of them. Cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until bread is golden and cheese melted, turning sandwiches halfway through. Cut in half to serve.

Tomato-Chili Jam Recipe Ingredients:

- 1 28-ounce can diced tomatoes
- 1 jalapeno pepper
- 2 teaspoons garlic, chopped
- 2 tablespoons ginger, chopped
- 2 tablespoons fish sauce
- 1 cup brown sugar
- ¾ cup red wine vinegar

Directions:

 In a food processor, purée half the tomatoes and their juices with jalapeño, garlic and ginger. Place in a deep pot with fish sauce, sugar and vinegar and boil slowly, stirring constantly.

 When it reaches a boil, lower heat to simmer and add remaining tomatoes. Simmer gently for 30 to 40 minutes until dark red and jam-like. Pour into a bowl, cool and refrigerate until needed.

Tip: For another taste, try Black Kassel Speck, which is like a smoked prosciutto.



SOFT CORN TORTILLAS WITH RAJAS AND QUESO (Makes 8 tacos)

Rajas

- 4 fresh poblano chiles
- Olive oil, for brushing
- 2 large yellow onlons, peeled and cut into ½-inch slices
- Kosher or sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese (for topping)

Soft Corn Tortillas

- 1 cup instant corn masa flour
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¾ cup warm water

Directions:

Prepare a hot fire in your grill. Brush the poblanos with olive oil and grill, turning often, until the skins blister and burn. Transfer to a sealable plastic bag and let them steam and soften. Brush the onions with olive oil and grill until you have good grill marks on both sides, about 10 minutes total. Remove the stems, skin and seeds from the poblanos, and then slice into thin strips. Cut the onion slices in half and break apart with a fork into strands. Combine the poblanos and onions and season with salt and pepper to taste. Keep the rajas warm until serving.

To make the tortillas, place the masa flour and salt in a bowl. Stir in the water to make soft dough, adding a little more water if necessary. Divide the dough into 8 portions, forming each portion into a ball. Cover with a damp cloth to keep the dough moist. Place each ball of dough between two unopened plastic sandwich bags, then press to a 5- to 6-inch round in a tortilla press. Preheat an ungreased skillet over medium-high.



A playmaker on defense, senior Cole McCormick spearheads a defensive linebacking trio that has now received an additional shot in the arm with the addition of the hard hitting Schalit.

With junior Tommy Zitiello — the Sharks' leading tackler from last season currently sidelined with an injury — Toblin was able to utilize his depth by plugging in a number of players who shut out Nease from scoring in the second half of their 35-14 conquest.

Toblin did express some concerns he had with his Sharks, however.

"We have to protect the football," Tob-

lin quickly pointed out. "We also have to tackle better, particularly on quarterback scrambles. Nease's quarterback hurt us with his running a number of times during the game and Palatka's QB also runs extremely well."

Toblin was pleased with the Sharks' physicality against the Panthers last Friday, and he is confidence their toughness will carry throughout the entire season.

"Whatever we might lack in talent from what we've had here in seasons' past, our kids this year play hard!" Toblin said.

On offense, Toblin has a problem, but it's a good one, and certainly not a concern. Who does he play at quarterback? Senior Jack Murrah and sophomore Cobi Myers showed plenty of promise as signal callers last season, with each displaying special talents. Murrah, who threw for nearly 1,300 yards, is the passing specialist, while Myers is a talented runner who also possesses a strong arm.

Based on Friday's night's showing against Nease, Toblin believes he will have an improved running game in 2018. Mack Calvin and sophomore Campbell Parker each rushed for over 100 yards against Nease behind an offensive line that returns a three-year starter in tackle Gunnar Goetz and guard Christian Ventouras.

Toblin also welcomes back three returning wideouts who saw valuable action in 2017. Kyle Barker, who caught 30 passes for 426 and three touchdowns, not only will replace Stepp as a big play receiver, but also will take over Stepp's role as a kickoff and punt returner.

The remaining wideouts are also wellrounded athletes who doubled as stalwarts on the Ponte Vedra basketball team. Senior Nick Pirris could be a college prospect at tight end, while Reese Russi and first-year player Logan Conway will provide nice targets for Murrah and Myers.

Sharks fans could not ask for a more convenient schedule this season. Sharks Stadium will host six home games, beginning this Friday night against Palatka.



Jaguars lose WR Lee for season after knee injury

For the second straight year, the Jacksonville Jaguars will be without their top receiver, after coach Doug Marrone announced Monday that Marqise Lee will have season-ending knee surgery and be placed on injured reserve.

"Obviously, it's a loss for us," Marrone said. "Marqise brought a level of toughness to that room. He was obviously a very productive player for us in the past, specifically on third down."

Lee suffered the knee injury when Atlanta Falcons safety Damontae Kazee delivered a low blow during last Saturday's preseason game at TIAA Bank Field. Kazee was penalized for lowering his helmet to initiate contact.

Lee pulled in 56 receptions for 702 yards and three touchdowns in 2017-2018, a season that started in a similar manner when former Jaguars receiver Allen Robinson suffered a torn ACL in the team's first game of the season against the Houston Texans. Lee was counted on to fill the void for Robinson, and has become a veteran leader in the locker room. Now, it will be up to Lee's fellow receivers to do the same. Fortunately, those other receivers have the confidence of their head coach.

"I feel very confident about the players that we have at that position," Marrone said on Monday. "I still see there is competition there. We're not settled on some of the spots at receiver, but we feel that we are good enough to go into the season with the guys that we think can make the team."

Among those guys is second-year player Keelan Cole, the undrafted free agent who last year had 42 receptions for 748 yards and three touchdowns. He knows what is expected of him now.

"I've just got to step up," he said. "I know he's (Lee) going to be there physically and spiritually, so we're just going to listen to him and keep learning and keep on moving forward."

The Jaguars will also have to count on Donte Moncrief, the fifth-year player formerly of the Indianapolis Colts whom the Jaguars signed as a free agent in the offseason, and second-year player Dede Westbrook, the former Biletnikoff Award winner at Oklahoma who had 27 receptions for 339 yards and one touchdown last year with Jacksonville.

Also expected to deliver in Lee's absence is rookie receiver DJ Chark Jr., who was drafted by the Jaguars in the second round of the 2018 NFL Draft out of LSU. So far, the rookie has received rave reviews during training camp and the preseason. He told the Recorder after the Falcons game he understands expectations for him have risen after Lee's injury.

"I feel like now more is required from me," Chark said. "At first, I was a guy that was being brought along for future references. Play here and there, play with


the ones but it wasn't on my shoulders. And now it's still not on my shoulders, but a lot more is required.

"The role has increased and at this point, the team is getting cut pretty soon to 53, which means, I was already going to be involved heavily, but now it's way more serious, because the numbers are shorter," Chark added. "So now I have to just make sure I'm holding up my end of the bargain for my team and myself."

With Lee going down, many have questioned if the Jaguars will consider targeting a free agent such as former Dallas Cowboy Dez Bryant, which Marrone generally addressed on Monday.

"No, I think we feel comfortable with what we have now," Marrone said about targeting the waiver wire. "If we feel at any position that we can get ourselves better, we're always going to look at that. That's kind of business as usual for us."

Key takeaways from Jaguars' preseason game against Falcons

Although Marqise Lee's injury was the dominant headline coming out of Jacksonville's 17-6 preseason win over the Atlanta Falcons last Saturday, that wasn't the only takeaway from the game. The stellar play of the Jaguars' running backs, another strong performance from the defense and continued, impressive play from backup quarterback Cody Kessler, served as additional, and important, storylines to discuss.

WATCH OUT FOR THE RUNNING BACKS THIS YEAR

If Saturday's preseason contest against the Falcons is any indication of what is to come this season, the Jaguars may have a three-headed monster in the form of running backs Leonard Fournette, T.J. Yeldon and Corey Grant.

The backs totaled nearly 200 yards of offense ... in a preseason game. Fournette rushed for 57 yards on 10 carries and added three catches for 18 yards. At the beginning of the second quarter, he made a Madden-like cut of beauty that resulted in a 21-yard rushing score.

"Coach was telling me how their defense was going to play it and to be patient and trust your run gaps and run scheme and it came open," Fournette explained.

Grant added five carries for 32 yards and five receptions for 39 yards, while Yeldon contributed five carries for 23 yards and three catches for 23 yards. Throughout the evening, the Jaguars creatively called plays that featured more than one of them on the field, which Marrone said is all about getting more playmakers on the field.

"Same thing with Leonard (Fournette) being out there on third down a little bit more, but T.J. (Yeldon) we know can carry a load on first or second down, Corey (Grant) is a guy that has some speed that is a really good changeup for those two," Marrone said. "So, we're just trying to continue to look at ways that can help us move the football."

DEFENSE CONTINUES TO BE THE HALLMARK OF THE JAGUARS

The Atlanta Falcons were a top-10 offense in the NFL in 2017-2018, gaining 364.8 yards and posting 22.1 points per game. Against the Jaguars on Saturday night, the Falcons, who played most of their starters through the first half, finished with 261 total yards and six points.


On Atlanta's two scoring drives in the first half, the Falcons seemed to be gaining momentum as Matt Ryan and company drove the team downfield. But each time, the Jaguars made a stand.

On the Falcons' first drive of the game, Jaguars defensive lineman Malik Jackson sacked Ryan on second down at the Jacksonville 29-yard line. The following play, cornerback Tyler Patmon deflected Ryan's pass, leading to a Matt Bryant 47-yard field goal.

The Falcons would go three-and-out on three straight drives, which included sacks by cornerback D.J. Hayden and linebacker Myles Jack. Bryant's next field goal, and Atlanta's last points in the game, came at the end of the first half after safety Jarrod Wilson broke up a pass by Ryan in the corner of the end zone on third down. Ryan, a former NFL MVP, finished 5 of 12 for 57 yards. Backups Matt Schaub and Kurt Benkert totaled 10 of 21 for

154 yards. The team totaled 70 yards on the ground. The Falcons were 2 of 11 on third down.

"I think that we've shown a lot," Jackson said about the defense's performance this preseason. "We've shown growth and consistency and accountability and think that's the key thing right now."

It should be noted that star Falcons receiver Julio Jones did not play in the game. Regardless, the defense's performance was, once again, impressive.

KESSLER A RELIABLE OPTION AT QUARTERBACK

Blake Bortles is the starting quarterback for the Jacksonville Jaguars. There's no doubt about it this year. But his backup, Cody Kessler, is sure putting himself together a solid preseason. After Bortles played into the third quarter and finished 17 of 23 for 204 yards and two interceptions, Kessler entered the game and engineered an 11-play, 83-yard drive that resulted in an awkward 2-yard touchdown run by him off a fumbled snap.

Nevertheless, the former Brown finished the game 7 of 7 for 79 yards. And he finished the second preseason game against the Vikings 11 of 16 for 72 yards and the first game against the New Orleans Saints 14 of 17 for 139 yards and a touchdown.

Granted, Kessler has been playing against second- and third-team defenses during the preseason, but his numbers speak for themselves, and they should provide the Jaguars with comfort knowing they have a solid option if something were to happen to Bortles.



Iguana Investments submits Shipyards development plans for Riverfront Convention Center and Hotel









In early August, Iguana Investments delivered to the Jacksonville Downtown Investment Authority (DIA) its vision for the first phase development of the Shipyards, a 70-acre stretch of riverfront property south of TIAA Bank Field in downtown Jacksonville

According to the Jaguars, the proposal includes the construction of a riverfront convention center and accompanying hotel and was created in partnership with the joint venture of the DeBartolo Development Company and Rimrock Devlin Development. A development entity created by Jacksonville Jaguars owner Shad Khan, Iguana Investments was selected by the DIA in April 2017 as the master developer of Jacksonville's Shipyards.

"Today's proposal represents the first step in delivering the vision we first shared three years ago for the rebirth of downtown Jacksonville," Khan said when the plans were submitted. "The Shipyards is the optimal and obvious site for a new Jacksonville convention center. First, you have the prime riverfront access and the sense of being a true destination that only the Shipyards can offer. Then, you have the synergies with the existing sports venues plus the anticipated mixed-use development planned for Lot J. We're doing big things in Jacksonville and this plan with DeBartolo and Rimrock is our boldest plan to date."


The Jaguars said highlights of the Rimrock Devlin DeBartolo proposal include a 490,000-square-foot state-of-the-art public convention center and convention hotel with views of and access to the St. Johns River and public riverwalk. The convention center hotel, the team added, also includes a 200,000-square-foot multi-purpose exhibit hall, a 40,000-square-foot ballroom with elevated views of the river and 45 breakout rooms. A 350-key full-service hotel would connect to the convention space and offer additional ballroom and meeting space, a rooftop pool and ground floor retail and restaurant opportunities along Bay Street.

"Our goal at DeBartolo Development is to focus on extraordinary development opportunities that will create a catalytic impact on the cities in which they are located," said Edward Kobel, president and COO of DeBartolo Development Group. "We were naturally drawn to this opportunity because of the impact it will have on downtown Jacksonville, and it's one of the most exciting projects I've been involved with in my career. With the development team we have assembled, we have the leadership and resources to make this vision a reality."

Rimrock Devlin Development echoed the excitement about the project.

"Jacksonville is our home, and our goal has always been to be involved with, and contribute to, the transformation of downtown Jacksonville into a vibrant city core," said Micah Linton and Wallace Devlin of Rimrock Devlin Development. "We are ecstatic to take the first step in making this vision a reality, and believe that our vision for the Convention Center and Hotel will serve as the impetus to spur future development downtown."

You can work to become an investor

This weekend, we observe Labor Day, a holiday to honor all the hard-working people in this country. As one of them, keep in mind that your efforts can have positive results. Famed film producer Samuel Goldwyn once said: "The harder I work, the luckier I get." And this same philosophy can apply to your investing, too — be-

cause you can indeed work to become a better investor. Consider these steps:

- Work to understand your goals and risk tolerance. Self-knowledge is important in all phases of life and it's certainly essential to you when you invest. For one thing, you need to know your goals. How long do you plan to work? What would you like to do when you retire? If you have children, do you expect to help pay for their college educations? You'll also need to know your risk tolerance to help determine your investment choices. Investors with a high tolerance for risk typically can overlook the day-to-day fluctuations in the financial markets, and may be comfortable investing more aggressively. But those with a low risk tolerance may be more inclined to focus on investments that offer greater preservation of principal, even if this means sacrificing some growth potential.

According to the authors of "Hack-Proof Your Life Now," written in 2016, in just 24 hours, scammers would target the public with 94 billion emails. That's 34 trillion malicious emails a year. Identity thieves would impersonate 35,000 people and wreak havoc with their finances and credit —more than 13 million victims annually, including 500,000 children. Hackers would likely blackmail 88,000 computer owners and demand ransom to unlock their encrypted PCs, 32 million in 12 months, more than one victim per second. These numbers are why the cybersecurity experts suggest that it is likely that our personal information has been exposed in a data breach or hack, especially given the number of hacks during the past few years.

Identity theft is the hottest cybercrime today, and the internet is the criminal's best friend! Every year, thousands of people are victims of identity theft, and it can happen to anyone at any time. Cybersecurity is too important to ignore. Therefore, during each of my next few columns, I will provide one critical tip to help protect you from fraudsters, hackers and thieves!

So away we go with tip No. 1: Our email address is the key to our digital lives. We share it with countless businesses, organizations and people. If you've used the internet for any amount of time, you have entered your email address at a host of online accounts for shopping, traveling, exercising, gaming, dating and more. We don't think twice, but we should! Having your email addresses in so many databases puts you at a significant risk. Hackers routinely breach the security networks of many organizations that hold your primary email address. That stolen personal data, paired with poor email security, leads to

The CEO of IdentityTheftSecurity. com and security writer explained, "It has been said that if you own a person's email, you own the person. This means that once your email is hacked, pretty much your entire digital life is up for grabs. So even if you've done your due diligence to have all your passwords be different, if your email is hacked and it's associated with your other online accounts, the hacker could simply use a reset password and get access to all your other accounts."

Check out the following story of professor and software security expert, Herbert Thompson. Thompson bet a friend that he could hack into her bank account. With her permission, he began. He first googled her name and stumbled upon her blog and an old resume. From the blog, he got her personal email address and her old college email address from her resume. Now he was on his way. Thompson was able to use the "forgot my password" feature on her college email account to get in using the personal information listed on her resume. Once he reset that password, he was able to reset her current email address having the link sent to her college email.

Once he was in her personal email, he could reset her online banking password. Now, you may not care if someone hacks into your Food Network or Yelp account, but you certainly don't want your online banking exposed in the same way. This is why you need to create a separate, secret email for your financial accounts. This email address should be unidentifiable — don't use your first name, last name, initials or other identifying information. It should also be protected by a strong and unique password. A separate email address reduces your digital footprint and if your primary, non-financial email address is exposed in a hack, it will not be connected to your financial accounts. This is a key step in boosting your security.

The Cultural Center's board-certified music therapists, Minda Gordon and Candice Sirak, utilize music as an educational service to promote learning and skill acquisition. Additionally, the practice can enhance mood and optimize the student's ability to learn and interact.

The Cultural Center added that melody is processed by a different area of the brain than speech and language. As a result, the center said a child may be able to more easily absorb information and skills presented with music. One of the purposes of the Cultural Center's therapy program is to provide children with varied disabilities assistance through melodic and rhythmic strategies, followed by the fading of musical cues to aid in generalization and transfer to other learning environments.

The Cultural Center is striving to one day be able to offer music therapy in all St. Johns County elementary school and expand the program into middle and high schools.

The Cultural Center is hosting a special event on Saturday, Oct. 6 to raise money for Sound Connections. Coined "The Sounds of Music," this music-filled night will include a silent auction, dinner and three musical acts performed by the children themselves along with special guests Players by the Sea and the St. Augustine Orchestra. 
