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Initiative to battle bigotry

Recent events have laid bare a growing antisemitism across the nation. Many of the boldest examples have occurred in places traditionally associated with scholarship and a respect for diverse cultures and opinions: college campuses.

But expressions of hate have not been confined to institutions of higher learning. Neither do they target a single group of people.

Now, local community leaders from diverse backgrounds are implementing an initiative launched in 2020 by UF Hillel to combat antisemitism and all forms of hate, a

Providing the gifts of hope, kindness

MaliVai Washington Foundation spreads holiday spirit through community

The MaliVai Washington Foundation does its part in giving back to the community in a variety of ways, and one of those traditions is its annual toy drive known as the Holiday Angels program.

This year, gifts were donated, gathered and delivered to more than 300 children who are considered to be in low-income or at-risk situations.

According to Terri Florio, executive director at the MaliVai Washington Foundation, the ability to give every child and families the sense of true holiday spirit by letting them know someone cares about them and that they are not alone is the ultimate goal of the Holiday Angels program.

"We've been doing this since 2000," Florio said. "It's kind of morphed from the 27 kids we had in our program in 2000, to now 23 years later and serving 200 kids and nearly 150 families."

Every child that asked for a toy in the program gets at least a new toy, a new pair of sneakers and a new outfit, but sometimes donors will buy a couple of each thing listed.

"It's a nice time of the year for the community to come together and do something nice for someone who might not have as

much as they do," Florio said.

The foundation's main office and center is located at 1055 West Sixth Street in Jacksonville.

"This is an incredibly challenged area with the highest violent crime and homi-

\$1M project to add parking, ADA-accessible walkover to park

St. Johns County is moving forward with plans to provide a new ADA-accessible beach walkover and additional off-beach parking at Crescent Beach Park, 6930 A1A S., St. Augustine. The walkover and expanded parking will use the space previously occupied by the South Beach Grill. St. Johns County purchased the restaurant's former location at 45 Cubbedge Road, St. Augustine, for \$2 million in June 2022.

The project budget is \$995,000 from the Fiscal Year 2024 Budget, which includes \$145,000 for demolition and design and \$850,000 for construction. Demolition of the site is ongoing, with the project expected to be completed by the end of 2024.



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good-will effort called Spread Cream Cheese Not Hate®.

Each January, Jewish and non-Jewish student volunteers invite others at the University of Florida to sign a pledge to combat hate and to keep the community safe and welcoming. In return, they receive a free bagel and cream cheese. The bagel is a way to help break the ice, to start a conversation, to ultimately build a coalition of people working together toward this common

goal

The goal is to promote tolerance and understanding among people from different backgrounds.

Last year, Tammy Shumer and Karen Freedman, then-co-presidents of Beth El The Beaches Synagogue, learned of an initiative by The B'nai Tzedek Next Gen Grant Making Committee of the Jewish Federation & Foundation of Northeast Florida to support programming that would combat antisemitism, bias and hate. They saw an opportunity to partner with the surrounding community to implement the Spread Cream Cheese Not Hate® initiative.

Christ Church, Palms Presbyterian, JaxTHRIVE and students from UNF have joined the effort, and more than 50 volunteers have been trained to encourage dialogue and education about the issue.

The churches are planning pledge events this month (with a goal of 1,000 pledges), and the initiative will commence with a kick-off dinner featuring guest speakers as well as teen leaders from Ponte Vedra High School, Landrum Middle School, Episcopal High School and Bolles High School. There will be follow-up educational programs in February.

"We feel these actions will demonstrate the strength of our community in standing against antisemitism and all forms of hate and have the potential to make a meaningful impact," Freedman wrote in an article for Jewish Life Magazine.

The club became renowned for its parties. The most famous was the "Grand Bal Masque," held each February at a hotel. It "eclipsed anything of the season," according to one scribe. Two hundred attendees, many of them masked, would dance to an orchestra until 2 a.m.

cide rates in the city," Florio said. "A lot of our kids witness or are around a lot of that stuff, so to bring some holiday joy is really important to us."

It has been a busy time of year for the MaliVai Washington Foundation, which began around Thanksgiving, when they sorted food items for families instead of toys.

Other events the nonprofit was a part of during December were the ability for children in the program to shop with a Jacksonville Jaguars player, where the children had the opportunity to shop not just for themselves but also for their family members.

"We also had children drink smoothies with Josh Allen here on Monday (Dec. 18), but this is truly the culmination of our holiday season. Every day you look at it and wonder how it's all going to get done, but at the end of the day the kids are happy, and the families are happy."

The support from the community is key to helping make sure the programs are a success, and the volunteers that helped

both gather and deliver gifts mean the world to Florio and the foundation's staff.

Another sign of that support is that the Furyk & Friends Foundation gave some of the food collected during its "Hope for the Holidays" food drive to the MaliVai Washington Foundation to disperse to its families in need.

Homework assistance, life skills classes and fitness activities, such as tennis, are just some of the services the foundation offers throughout the year.



Celebrate the new year with flowers

Happy 2024! With the arrival of the new year, we make many fresh starts in our lives. Be sure to include flowers in your plans! Many blooms symbolize luck or new beginnings and are, therefore, perfect for centerpieces, decorations or just new additions to your home.

• Orchids represent luck, wealth, abundance, luxury and beauty. They are available in a variety of colors and make a thoughtful gift. An orchid prefers a bright environment, but not direct sunlight, and requires little maintenance other than proper watering.

- Daffodils are traditional symbols of new beginnings or rebirth. Although many associate these blooms with spring, they are also a popular gift for the new year just be sure to give more than one as some believe a single daffodil bloom symbolizes bad luck!
- Lotus flowers submerge into the water and mud around them at the end of each day but blossom again the following morning as a beautiful bloom above the water.

Their waxy petals do not hold the mud, producing a clean, bright bloom each day. For these reasons, a lotus flower is a symbol of rebirth and purity, but they also represent wealth, peace, grace and devotion.


• Calla lilies symbolize youth, purity and new beginnings. Their name comes from the Greek word for beauty, and the blooms have silky, elegant petals. The white calla lily is most recognizable and often used in wedding bouquets. However, these flowers are available in a variety of colors including yellow (meaning friendship), black (meaning mystery) and purple (meaning royalty).


- Alstroemeria represents fortune, prosperity and wealth. It is also known as the Peruvian lily and features a trumpet-shaped bloom. These flowers are wonderful additions to arrangements as they can last up to two weeks when cut.
- Hyacinth flowers are signs of new beginnings and change, but they are also used in Christian churches to symbolize joy and love. A hyacinth plant has long leaves and one to three spikes full of purple/blue flowers. They have a pleasant scent but contain oxalic acid that can cause skin irritation (be sure to wear gloves if working with the blooms).
- Peonies represent prosperity, innocence, dignity and compassion. Red blooms in particular are symbols of good luck and are, therefore, often seen in gifts or decorations around New Year's. Peonies produce large blooms in a variety of colors.

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


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Jacksonville Boat Show set for Jan. 26-28

Ground broken for \$32.5M road project in St. Johns County

St. Johns County held a groundbreaking ceremony on Dec. 21 to celebrate the start of the \$32.5 million County Road 2209 Road Improvement Project. This project will add an additional four miles of four-lane road from SilverLeaf Parkway to State Road 16 with a sidewalk on one side and 12-foot-wide multi-purpose path on the other.

"This project is more than just a road project and a sidewalk; it's about building a better St. Johns County for the people of our community," District 2 County

Commissioner and St. Johns Board of County Commissioners Chair Sarah Arnold said.

District 7 state Sen. Travis Hutson participated in the ceremony.

"It's been about a decade of this being a priority, and we finally delivered on it, so the state is partnering up with the county, and this is going to relieve the congestion that you see on 95," Hutson said. "So, we are happy to be a partner and it is going to help a lot for the residents."

A ceremonial dirt toss included Arnold, Hutson, District 3 County Commissioner Roy Alaimo, District 5 County Commissioner Henry Dean, County Administrator Joy Andrews, Public Works Director Greg Caldwell and project manager Valerie Pacetti.

This project will cost \$32.5 million and is funded by Florida Department of Transportation grants and Capital Improvement Project funds from the county. This is one of 35 transportation projects totaling \$183 million that is available on

the county's Capital Improvement Project Public Access Dashboard.

Currently, the county is extending the existing box culvert across Mill Creek to accommodate the road widening project.

England-Thims and Miller Inc. led the civil design work and J.B. Coxwell Contracting, Inc. will be the contractor for the project.

Construction is set to break ground this month and will be completed in January 2026 weather permitting.

\$192M water reclamation facility OK'd

During its Dec. 19 regular meeting, the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners approved phase 2 of the State Road 207 Water Reclamation Facility Project. This included awarding the design-build agreement with Jacobs Project Management Co. for the new S.R. 207 Water Reclamation Facility and Associated Improvements for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$191.82 million including a contingency of \$6.23 million.

"This project regionalizes availability of reclaimed water, promotes water conservation and strengthens the utility department's position to protect our future water resource," said St. Johns County Utility Director Neal Shinkre. "The strength of our financial position allows us to deliver these infrastructure projects with no rate impacts to our customers."

This project will provide a state-of-the-art advanced wastewater facility that collects and cleanses water to be reused for lawn irrigation. Recycled water is part of the county's plan to be more sustainable, diversify its water sources and protect the environment. Currently, the county recycles 56% of all wastewater treatment flows for beneficial


purposes to replace the use of traditional freshwater supplies.

Senate Bill 64 requires a statewide elimination of non-beneficial surface water discharges of effluent and this project will move the county forward in meeting this goal before the implementation deadline in 2032. The project includes a 13-mile pipeline network maximizing delivery of reclaimed water for residential irrigation and over the next 20 years, helps reduce more than a million pounds of nutrients discharged to the Matanzas River.

On Sept. 6, 2022, the board had authorized the county administrator to execute a design-build agreement with Jacobs Project Management Co. to complete phase 1 of the agreement for a not-to-exceed amount of \$30 million and to negotiate a guarantee maximum price (GMP) amendment for presentation to the board for completion of Scope 2.

The project is funded primarily through utility bond proceeds. This will not affect customer rates.

Currently, the project is in Phase 1 with 62% completion and the entire project is scheduled to be completed in May 2026.



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




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




























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Syndrome in bats is subject of lecture

Whitney Laboratory, will be Thursday, Jan. 11, at 6 p.m. with the program titled "Battle for the Bats: Development of Treatments for White Nose Syndrome." Christine Salomon PhD, associate professor, Center for Drug Design, University of Minnesota, will be the speaker.

This free lecture will be presented in person at the UF Whitney Laboratory Lohman Auditorium, 9505 Ocean Shore Blvd., St. Augustine. Those interested also have the option of registering to watch via Zoom live the night of the lecture.

White nose syndrome is a disease of hibernating bats that is rapidly spreading across North America and causing devastating losses of bat populations. It is caused by a fungal pathogen called Pseudogymnoascus destructans, which is readily spread between bats and persists in hibernation environments.

The Salomon Lab's work is focused on identifying microbes associated with bats and on surfaces in caves and mines that can inhibit the growth of the pathogen. They are studying the chemistry of the active microbes and working to translate promising laboratory results into complex field conditions. Their ultimate goal is to develop a safe, effective, live biological control product to treat hibernacula surfaces to slow the spread and development

In this talk, Salomon will present some of their latest findings and discuss the challenges of working with fungi and bats

Salomon earned her bachelor degree in marine biology from Long Island University and PhD in oceanography from Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UCSD. After a postdoctoral fellowship in microbiology at the University of Minnesota, she started her independent research program.

The Salomon Lab is focused on the discovery and application of chemical compounds produced in nature, especially from unique bacteria and fungi isolated from subterranean cave and mine environments. These compounds are being tested and developed for applications as biopesticides, biological controls for animal and plant diseases, and for infectious disease in humans.

Tools available for family business transitions

Transitioning your family business to your heirs may sound simple enough, but in fact, doing it successfully can prove difficult. To help improve your transition's chances for success, consider family business governance.

This is a system of correlated tools and actions to support the next generation with controlling, owning and operating the business. It also puts in place a framework that contains business protocols, describes how future ownership changes occur and establishes a precedent for making business decisions.

Frequently used tools

There are several tools that can be employed as part of a family business governance system, including:

A buy-sell agreement is a legally binding contract that stipulates how an owner's share of a business may be reassigned if triggering events occur, the price that will be paid and the payment

A family employment policy document can be kept within the family for private use or incorporated into the business's human resource documentation. It sets expectations for heirs, spouses and extended family members about such issues as how they can obtain employment in the business, the requirements to attain key positions, the compensation standards to be used and incentive language for family members.

A distribution or dividend policy is key in setting expectations with family members regarding what distributions they should expect to receive from the business. Business owners must balance the need for cash to maintain or grow

the business with the desire to receive distributions.

A professional board of directors is a governing body that helps oversee the business and makes major decisions. A board generally comprises three, five or seven professionals from various industries that have the subject matter expertise to assist the company strategically.

A funny thing happened on the way to the recession

Two and a half months ago, I was talking to a friend of mine about Wall Street adages. He is also in the investment management business and his son and my son both run cross country for

Ponte Vedra High School. There are an insane number of investment adages, and many are complete and opposite wisdoms. The one that caught our combined imagination was "Wall Street climbs a wall of worry."

At the time, the market was setting a near term low, and things looked bleak for a stock market that had just previously begun to show a slight glimmer of hope. It was memorable, because we both blurted out the adage at the same time. For a brief moment, we bonded on that thought, both thrilled by our shared latent optimism.

At the time, the prevailing wisdom was that the United States would be going into a recession either next quarter or the quarter after or the quarter after that. "Recessions don't usually announce themselves in advance," I declared. He nodded in agreement. "They usually come out of nowhere and blindside you on a random Tuesday afternoon." We both laughed and

went back to our volunteer jobs at our home Cross Country meet. The Ponte Vedra meet is named in honor of Craig Speziale. Craig was the first principal at Ponte Vedra and beloved. He died suddenly, and I wanted to take this chance to remember him.

Anyway, back to the recession, the one that has been coming for years now. The one that may never come. The idea that there was a recession out there on the horizon, that we could see it coming, but had not really reacted to it, never made sense to me. The stock market is a forward-looking indicator. In other words, it is predictive and not reactive. If a recession were coming, the stock market and stock prices should be signaling that in advance. And it just wasn't. Stocks were signaling inflation concerns and institutional uncertainty.

Ever since that random conversation with another investment adviser at running meet, the market has steadily been getting stronger, like a snowball rolling

down a mountain into this December's "Santa Claus Rally." That rally came out of nowhere and left many scratching their heads and asking each other, "What happened to the recession?"

"Santa Claus Rally" is another Wall Street saying. It refers to a December rally where the market goes up dramatically around the holidays. It does not happen every year, no matter how often we ask. But in years when the economy is good, we often see robust returns in December. The fact that we got one this year suggests there are more positive returns to come.

I do not know what the market is going to do in 2024; no one does. But, if I had to bet, and my choices were between a much-advertised recession and a surprise market rally, I would bet

What should you know about RMDs?

You may spend decades contributing to various retirement accounts. But for some accounts, such as a traditional IRA and 401(k), you must start withdrawing funds at a certain point. What should you know about this require-

To begin with, the rules governing these withdrawals — technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs — have changed recently. For many years, individuals had to begin taking their RMDs (which are based on the account balance and the

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IRS' life expectancy factor) when they turned 701/2. The original SECURE Act of 2019 raised this age to 72, and SECURE 2.0, passed in 2022, raised it again, to 73. (If you turned 73 in 2023, and you were 72 in 2022 when the RMD limit was still 72, you should have taken your first RMD for 2022 by April 1 of this year. You will then need to take your 2023 RMD by Dec. 31. And going forward, you'll also need to take your RMDs by the end of every

Not all retirement accounts are subject to RMDs. They aren't required for a Roth IRA, and, starting in 2024, won't be required for a Roth 401(k) or 403(b) plan. But if your account does call for RMDs, you do need to take them, because if you don't, you could face tax penalties. Previously, this penalty was 50% of the amount you were supposed to have taken, but SECURE 2.0 reduced it to 25%.

When you take your RMDs, you need to be aware of a key issue: taxes. RMDs are taxed as ordinary income. and, as such, they could potentially bump you into a higher tax bracket and possibly even increase your Medicare premiums, which are determined by your modified adjusted gross income. Are there any ways you could possibly reduce an RMD-related tax hike?

You might have some options. Here are two to consider:

• Convert tax-deferred accounts to Roth IRA. You could convert some, or maybe all, of your tax-deferred retirement accounts to a Roth IRA. By doing so, you could lower your RMDs in the future — while adding funds to an account you're never required to touch. So, if you don't really need all the money to live on, you could include the remainder of the Roth IRA in your estate plans, providing an initially tax-free inheritance to your loved ones. However, converting a tax-deferred account to a Roth IRA will generate taxes in the year of conversion, so you'd

In what's known as a qualified charitable distribution, you can move up to \$100,000 of your RMDs directly from a traditional IRA to a qualified charity, avoiding the taxes that might otherwise result if you took the RMDs yourself. After 2023, the \$100,000 limit will be indexed to inflation.

Of course, before you start either a Roth IRA conversion or a qualified charitable distribution, you will need to consult with your tax adviser, as both these moves have issues you must consider and may not be appropriate for your situation.

But it's always a good idea to know as much as you can about the various aspects of RMDs — they could play a big part in your retirement income strategy.




SVU is now a nonprofit charity which has contributed to cold case resolution through an interactive map, road signs and relationships with law enforcement and forensics personnel.

Saint Augustine Film Festival is Jan. 11-14


Big names in film will be in St. Augustine for the 14th annual Saint Augustine Film Festival, taking place Jan. 11-14 in St. Augustine venues.

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Persistence results in 81 gold medals

81-year-old's goal to stay fit leads to powerlifting prowess

Eighty-one is a lot in most instances, especially when it comes to one's age or the number of gold medals won, and for David Parsons, he checks both of those boxes.

Parsons recently won his 81st gold medal in powerlifting and did so at the Florida Senior Games, which is a competition for people older than 50 years old, on Dec. 11.

However, what makes the achievement even more unique is that he did not start weight training until he was about 30 years old.



"My dad introduced me to Olympic lifting and taught me basic lifts as a kid, but I learned them out of curiosity and never really committed to doing much with it for years."

Then, years later he decided to put his focus into finding a way to get exercise and get fit, and he remembered the techniques his dad had taught him, and he started working out in his basement while living in Massachusetts.

"One day I was looking in a strength and weightlifting magazine that they were having AAU meets, and that my marks weren't that far off from those at the state meets and went on to finish fourth place in my first meet," Parsons said.

Ever since his first competition, he has gone on to earn a medal every time out, but he also noticed that he could not get higher than a bronze medal.

"I was one of the few that were not taking steroids and looking to take it to the professional level," Parsons said. "I just did it for exercise purposes, so why would I want to do something that would harm that. Health was always my top priority"

As his sons got older they began powerlifting and eventually body building and the family even competed in the same events at times.

For years now, people have been taken back when they find out he is a power-lifter, but the fact that they do not believe him when he first tells them is something he has come to take pride in, because he knows he came about it by natural hard work and dedication.

As he has gotten older and competed in categories where only those not taking

steroids can compete, the gold medals have begun to rack up each year, with multiple golds coming in some years.

"I compete in what they consider a category for lifetime drug-free participants," Parsons said.

One of his formulas for success is that strategy he employs during a competition and with his approach to powerlifting.

"Every time I strive to achieve a personal best year after year, but only by five pounds or so," Parsons said. "I do this either with more weight or more reps."

That strategy of consistency has helped him win a world championship and has allowed him to win a gold medal in every Florida Senior Games he has ever entered.

"It's like the story of the tortoise and the hare," Parsons said. "It's all about consistency and building over time. I only lift enough to win."

However, he also acknowledges the fact that his whole experience is a unique one.

"Most Olympic lifters reach their peak strength at 35 years old, but mine was 65, so it's kind of weird," Parsons chuckled. "It just shows that if you stick with it for a long period of time, you can do something that some would have never even dreamed possible."
