



## MSD discusses 'no parking' ordinance on San Juan Drive

#### **By Anthony Richards**

The Ponte Vedra Municipal Service District continues to consider the creation of a "no parking" ordinance along San Juan Drive and several residents attended the Jan. 8 meeting interested in the proposal.

The majority of those in attendance were in favor of having such an ordinance in place, many of whom live along the roadway and stated how dangerous it is when people park on the road.

"Every day I walk my dog I feel like I'm putting my life in my hands," resident Barbara Roberts said.

The MSD passed a "no parking" ordinance on Ponte Vedra Boulevard in 2021, and according to MSD trustee Brad Wester, that gives a template to use this time around.

"I think it's (Ponte Vedra Boulevard ordinance) worked perfectly," Wester said. "It takes a couple of years for that learned behavior to go away, but this is a start." He also believes that San Juan Drive



has the traffic numbers where an ordinance could also really make a difference.

However, after discussion it was agreed to hold a vote on proceeding with a possible ordinance until next meeting since the agenda specifically stated the "no parking" ordinance would be considered from Solana Road to North Pablo Road. but Wester suggested that the ordinance be extended to Ponte Vedra Boulevard.

Trustee Mickey White was all for the extension but asked if they should push back the vote to the next meeting because people may have read the specifics of the agenda and not come out to the meeting as a result.

MSD attorney Wayne Flowers agreed that voting at the next meeting would be a good approach and the board agreed to vote on it at the Feb. 12 meeting.

If the proposed ordinance is approved then it will go through the vetting process with the county, which takes about four to six months, according to Wester.

Another major topic of discussion was the cleanup of Sunset Park, which had first been introduced at the previous meeting in December.

Flowers found documentation of an agreement between the county and the MSD from years ago concerning the park, but the agreement was not signed.

According to Flowers, the county owns the park located on a piece of property off State Road A1A that stretches to the neighborhood behind, but the agreement states that the MSD would maintain the upkeep of the park, which the board agreed they will do.

Residents that live nearby mow and maintain the front of the lot and have done so for years and said they would be happy to continue doing it because it has become a real asset for the neighborhood as many children can often be seen out there running around and playing baseball.

However, trustee Kitty Switkes had brought it up initially because she was unaware of the back lot of the property until residents began talking to her about how much it had grown up over the

The MSD board voted unanimously to approve Switkes' request to accept a proposed bid from Tree Masters for \$1,500 to Bush Hog and mow the back lot and remove a dead pine tree that sits in the middle of it and haul off any debris.

"Some of the other bids I got were for \$2,100, \$2,600 and \$1,000, but all those were just for Bush Hogging and they did not include the removal of the tree," Switkes said.

In other news from the meeting, Wester informed the board that upgrades and repairs have been planned for all 14 beach access points in the MSD, and he is

continuing to work with St. Johns County officials in the drafting of the initial plan for the proposed sidewalk project along San Juan Drive.

# Fix that lower belly pooch

Ask any woman about her most problematic body issue, and chances are she'll name her lower belly "pooch." It's the annoying bulge that no amount of dieting, crunches or crying seems to be able to fix. Fortunately, when you understand the root causes of your pooch, you can reduce and even eliminate it in a matter of weeks.

#### What causes the "pooch?"

First, let's talk about what causes a pooch. It can happen at any stage of life, but it's common after having a child and for many women due to normal aging, heredity or weight gain and loss. Pregnancy changes your body in hundreds of ways, and it takes months for most women's bodies to return to their prepregnancy form.

Medical experts estimate that up to 60% of women experience abdominal muscle separation to some degree during the first year postpartum and that 33% are dealing with it beyond that. What most women would think was the answer — lots of sit-ups and crunches — actually can make the condition worse.


A pooch might not actually be fat, although the pooch may be covered in fat. It's actually poor displacement of abdominal pressure and core muscle weakness. The bad news is that a pooch may be more than a cosmetic problem; if it's not addressed, it can create medical problems later such as prolapse.

#### How to fix the pooch

My 4- to 6-week pooch program for women starts with breathing. Most of us have been breathing wrong for years, even decades, without knowing it. That's why many yoga instructors start class with a breathing practice. The correct way to breathe is called 360 breathing.

I help women learn to improve breath-

Once a patient is breathing correctly on a consistent basis, we work on posture. A natural and upright posture maintains a neutral pelvic position and allows you to breathe deeply. It also allows your glutes and deep core muscles to be available for use, especially the transverse abdominis, the muscles that run up and down the sides of your midsection like a girdle. The stronger these muscles become, the tighter your belly will look.

Then, I work on stretching and strengthening the pelvic floor, which is essential to fixing a pooch and maintaining your health over a lifetime. These essential muscles work with the deep abdominal and back muscles and the diaphragm to support the spine and control the pressure inside the abdomen. The deep layer of the pelvic floor provides support for your organs, while the superficial and middle layers help control urine and waste elimination.

I work with patients to learn to contract and release these muscles with an exercise therapists call "lifting the beans and dropping the beans." You lay on your side and imagine that you're picking up a bean with your anus and vagina. You lift it up gently inside of you about 1 cm, then drop it and relax your muscles. I recommend that patients start with three minutes of this two times per day.

The great thing about this exercise is that once you master it, you can do it anywhere and anytime. You can do it while sitting at your desk, standing in line, watching TV, fixing dinner or washing dishes. It will become second nature, and women will naturally perform this exercise throughout the day.

Once we've incorporated pelvic strengthening and relaxation into a patient's everyday life, we add in 20 minutes of daily exercise in a variety of moves that strengthen the hips, core and legs. Patients do bridges, squats, work with exercise bands and perform other movements, many of which elite athletes also use to build and maintain core

Generally, patients will see a significant improvement in their pooch after six weeks or so of consistent work. If they keep up the practice, they'll do more than fit into last year's jeans. They'll see health benefits that can last a lifetime.

CycleBar St. Johns aims to provide the area with a premier indoor cycling facility, and it is located at 205 Bartram Market Drive, Suite 160 in St. Johns.

It is an ideal time to open according to owner Susanne Krivanek, as it comes at the start of the new year when so many people are looking to rediscover and start off on the right foot from a fitness standpoint.

"When I came upon CycleBar and started to learn more about it and what they're all about, I was like, 'Wow this has some really good potential,' especially when you think about this area with all the new people moving in," Krivanek said.

"It's a party and an exercise class all in one," Zaifert

Krivanek believes that encouragement is key for a person to achieve the goals they have laid out for themselves, and that's the environment she has strived to create at CycleBar.

Krivanek wants CycleBar to not just be a business within the community, but she has goals to really get involved and help give back and be a part and connected to the local scene beyond the fitness options

"It's an awesome workout that is pretty easy on your joints, so whether you're just getting started or are an avid cyclist, this is the place for you," Krivanek said. "We even have one of our members who is a worldclass kickboxer, but he wants to improve his endurance."

## Level Up Fitness Jax: It's about transformation

At the dawn of each new year, countless people will inevitably resolve to get into shape. And before the end of January, many will abandon that goal for another year.

Brandon Floyd, co-owner of Level Up Fitness Jax, suggests mentally preparing oneself for as much as six months prior to tackling this goal and then take it one day at a time. Don't try to get in shape within the first week. Set long-term goals and take baby steps if necessary.

It's all part of adopting a new lifestyle, a perspective that reflects the approach Floyd and the other trainers take at his popular Jacksonville Beach gym.

Level Up Fitness Jax got the most votes in The Recorder's recent Best of the Beaches campaign. In a community with many successful fitness programs, that's no small achievement.

The focus of Level Up Fitness Jax is body transformation, and before-and-after photos covering walls in two of its rooms attest to its efficacy. It's a style Floyd developed over many years, beginning with his first job as a fitness instructor for the YMCA in Raleigh, North Carolina, when he was only 16.

A major part of the program's success is that it's highly individualized.

"You're not just coming in the gym and



doing reps and sets predicated on what everyone else is doing," Floyd said. "For each person who's in the gym, the programs are designed to tailor-fit their needs."

The training begins with a body scan that measures body fat percentage and

analyzes posture as well as photos for use as reference to guide progress. The client is entered into a portal where the details of each workout are posted.

"We're documenting what performance level you're at, how intense was your workout," Floyd said. "We're documenting things such as what we need to stay away from versus things you're good at. We're taking notes on you every workout."

This helps the trainers "level up" their clients from their initial condition to the goal they have set for themselves.

And while body transformation is the most obvious aim, it is part of a larger effort to holistically elevate mind, body and soul.

"If I'm not changing your mindset and if this program is not helping with that, the results are not going to be permanent," Floyd said. "It's not going to be a lifestyle. It's just going to be what I call a temporary fix."

And anyone mature enough to appreciate the value of working out can "level up." Floyd has clients across the age spectrum, even into their 80s.





hood, the monster of distraction, the monster of resistance," said the school's founder, Matthew Ahrnsbrak. "But they are heroes, and they have very important work to do."

And that important work is, of course, learning.

Acton Academy Ponte Vedra is part of a network of 300 schools worldwide. Though all have their roots in the original Acton Academy founded in 2009 by Jeff and Laura Sandefer in Austin, Texas, each retains its own character.

"Each Acton is going to be a little bit different, based on what each of the heroes brings to the studio," said Ahrnsbrak.

The local school began with what might best be described as grades two through five. This month, it expanded to include younger students, ages 5 though 7. Next year, Acton Academy Ponte Vedra plans to expand further to incorporate middle school. Ultimately, it will add high school grades.

But it is not structured the way traditional schools are structured. And though it shares some ideas put forth by Maria Montessori, it is not a Montessori school.

"I think the key defining factor that makes Acton Academy different than any other school here is the role of the

adults in the classroom," said Ahrnsbrak. "We don't have teachers. Our adults in the classroom are called Socratic guides, facilitators."

According to Ahrnsbrak, children are innate geniuses.

"It's not our job to impart knowledge onto them," he said. "But rather, create games and challenges and scenarios to bring out their genius. And some of the things that they've come up with in the studio are incredible."

The school day begins with a 15-minute Socratic discussion to "start the day intentionally." That is followed by core skills work: reading, writing, arithmetic. Curriculum is accessed via adaptive learning programs, such as Khan Academy and Lexia. The children are incentivized to complete their coursework so as to move on to higher levels and their progress is tracked.

Afternoons are reserved for "quests," sessions with special themes that change each five or six weeks. Currently, the students are learning about coding and robotics.

Aside from the state-mandated stan-

dardized test given each April, there are no exams. At the end of each six-week session, the students present an exhibition of the knowledge they have accumulated. This is another way to gauge their progress.

## Glaucoma vs. cataracts: What do you need to know?

Our eyes, like all other body parts, become more susceptible to disease as we age. The most common vision-related problems in older adults are glaucoma and cataracts. In fact, these are two of the most common causes of vision loss in the world.

However, few people understand how they differ and affect eyesight. Learn the key differences and crucial information about glaucoma and cataracts to ensure you're well-informed about your eye health.

#### Glaucoma vs. Cataracts

Glaucoma is an eye disease caused by increased pressure in the eyes. It steals away eyesight with very few or no symptoms, and once lost, vision cannot be restored. That makes early detection crucial.

A cataract is an age-related clouding of the lens of the eye. Just like with a camera, our eyes contain a lens to help us to focus on things whether they are nearby or far away. Glaucoma risk factors include age, race, family history and underlying health conditions, like diabetes. There are several types of glaucoma. One common type of glaucoma is primary open-angle glaucoma, which can lead to blind spots in your side vision. Angle-closure glaucoma can present with sudden vision loss, headaches and pain. Glaucoma can only be prevented through early diagnosis and prompt treatment.

#### Treatments for Cataracts and Glaucoma

A key difference between the two conditions pertains to treatment options. Cataracts can usually be removed through cataract surgery, allowing the patient to see clearly again. On the other hand, glaucoma symptoms can only be prevented, not reversed.

Glaucoma can lead to irreversible blindness. That's why patients who notice any changes in their vision should get an eye exam right away.

#### **Does Cataract Surgery Help Glaucoma?**

Cataract surgery is one of the most commonly performed procedures in the world, proven to be safe, fast, and effective. Thanks to advanced corrective lens technology, many patients see better after surgery than they ever did before.

What many patients don't realize is that cataract surgery can help improve glaucoma symptoms as well. That's because cataract surgery can lower high eye pressure. This is a big relief for many patients who are often unsure whether they can have cataract surgery with glaucoma. Some patients even have cataract surgery and a type of glaucoma surgery in a combination procedure.

#### **Take Control of Your Eye Health**

Remember, all patients 60 and over must receive regular, comprehensive eye exams so we can detect conditions like cataracts and glaucoma and begin treatment right away. # Avoid infection with proper contact lens care

As contacts sit directly on the eyes, it is important to avoid the introduction of foreign matter to the eye with careful hygiene and other practices. WebMD reports that those who wear contacts have a higher risk for keratitis, an infection of the cornea caused by viruses, bacteria, fungi, and rare parasites. It's also easier

to catch conjunctivitis. Smart contact lens usage can help people avoid infections and other eye irritation. Contact wearers can follow these guidelines.

- Wash hands before handling contacts. Always wash and dry your hands before touching contact lenses to avoid transfering microorganisms from your hands and fingers to the lenses.
- Rub the lenses while cleaning. The American Optometric Association says rubbing the lenses while cleaning them loosens the protein and bacteria that builds up. Even if the solution advertises "no rub," you should do it anyway.




- Always use fresh solution. Wash and store contacts in fresh, store-bought solution. Do not reuse solution, and never make homemade saline solution, which may not be sterile.
- Consider daily lenses. One way to cut down on the buildup of bacteria is to opt for daily lenses. These are

individually packaged and are only worn for one day before being discarded, as opposed to weekly or monthly lenses.

• Rest your eyes. Whenever possible, give your eyes a chance to "breathe," so to speak. Skip the contacts if you are at home and will not be encumbered by wearing eyeglasses. When utilizing contacts, do not wear them longer than is prescribed for that type of lens. Do not sleep in contacts unless they are designed for overnight wear.

Care must be given to contact lenses to avoid eye infections and other harmful conditions.

## St. Augustine Art Association marks 100 years

Artists and writers gathered in St. Augustine on Jan. 18, 1924, to form what they called the "The Galleon Club." These cultural trailblazers sought to transform the historic town into a thriving arts community for wintering artists. Artist after artist started traveling south to experience what the club advertised was "like Painting in Europe."

On Feb. 23, 2024, the St. Augustine Art Association — which became the official name in 1948 — will celebrate its 100th anniversary with the Beaux Arts Ball fundraising event at the Lightner Museum for an evening of dinner, dancing and fine art. Tickets are \$150 each or \$1,200 for a table of eight. Tickets can be purchased at staaa. org/beaux-arts-ball.

The Beaux Arts Ball is a nod to how the association would raise funds in the 1940s and beyond. With the help of affluent artistic families, the St. Augustine Art Association was able to form a more formal organization but needed its own space, so they put on the Beaux Arts Ball in what was then the Alcazar Hotel (now the Lightner Museum).

Otto Lightner himself hosted the event for years — the first of which is epitomized in a 1949 painting by artist Louise

In 1954, the association opened what

is now the main gallery building. With an official gathering space, the organization could finally exhibit work, host regular shows and sketch groups, and become the cultural epicenter for the vibrant and influential force for the arts that it is today.

"Celebrating such a significant and historic milestone feels surreal," said Jennifer Flynt, executive director. "For 100 years, artists have transformed this city into a flourishing arts community and arts destination. And I believe the magic of St. Augustine has certainly inspired many artists for more than 100 years. These creative minds continue to bring such beauty and energy into our town, which adds so much

to the history already here. It's an honor to support them, and I know that for the next 100 years we'll continue to do the same."

Prior to the ball, the association will host a celebratory open house, 4:30 to 6 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 18, at 22 Marine St., St. Augustine. Meet and mingle with members and friends as the St. Augustine Art Association toasts to the next 100 years. Ticket includes one drink ticket (cash bar after ticket), sweet and savory hors d'oeuvres and complimentary champagne. Tickets are \$19.24 each and can be purchased at staaa.org/100th-anniversary-



For the Nease Panthers, they have their sights set on finishing strong and going undefeated with three games remaining in the season.

The Panthers are 9-0-3 and have shut out their opponents on six occasions this season, with their largest margin of victory coming on Dec. 14 with a 6-0 triumph over Middleburg on the road.

Road warriors is probably the best term to describe the Panthers this season as time after time this season the Panthers have been tested on the road having played nine road games compared to just three at home to this point.

The ability to do whatever they can not to lose games is a unique quality and one that will pay dividends for the Panthers in the playoffs.

They will have senior night at the Panther Den on Jan. 11 against county rival Menendez at 6:30 p.m. and then finish up with two more road games against Creekside on Jan. 17 and Bishop Kenny on Jan. 18. Both of those games will start at 7:20 p.m.

With all the success both the Sharks and Panthers have had this year, it is a shame that both teams were not on the other's schedule this year, because it seems like it would have been a memorable game for both players and fans and just one more moment to cherish in what has been a memorable season to this point.


