





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D-Day, World War II veterans set to be remembered during banquet

The 79th anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy during World War II is coming up on June 6 and the We Can Be Heroes Foundation is set to hold its annual banquet in remembrance of that day.

This year's event will take place on June 6 at the Salem Centre Auditorium located at 7235 Bentley Road in Jacksonville with a social beginning at 5:30 p.m. followed by dinner at 6 p.m. and a special presentation at 6:30 p.m.

The foundation not only remembers the heroic and fateful day in history that D-Day was, but it also does its part to honor all the heroic World War II veterans who served during the ceremony.



Featured guests of honor at this year's event will include Retired United States Navy Capt. Gregory Streeter, D-Day veteran Floyd Chester "Chet" Galbraith and World War II veteran Julian Myra.

All of which will talk about their experiences during the battle and the war and look back at the heroes that came forward during that day.

As part of the ceremony, those in attendance will be able to meet the local person who helped spearhead the efforts to erect a Navy memorial at the site of D-Day at Utah Beach in Normandy, France in 2008, after there had not been one for six decades prior.

Those planning to attend the event are asked to invite World War II veterans they may know as their guests to the ceremony, as it is a day in place to honor them and their sacrifice.

Seating is limited and tickets are \$30

per person or \$155 for a table of six and \$205 for a table of eight. Veterans and Gold Star families receive a 10% discount, as well as any tickets donated to veterans.

High school facilities to open to public Wednesdays during summer

Even though school will be out this summer, the St. Johns County School District has announced that it will be allowing the use of high school facilities to the public at certain days and times during the summer.

As part of the announced program, certain Wednesdays from 6-8 p.m. will allow for public high school in the county to open their track, tennis courts and outdoor basketball courts to the public for during those two-hour periods.

The program is part of the school board's continued push to put the community's health and wellness initiative at the forefront by offering residents an additional place to go to get exercise and maintain a healthy lifestyle during the summer months.

The specific days the facilities will be open include every Wednesday in June and July with the lone exception being July 5, due to its proximity to the Independence Day holiday.

Facilities on campus that will remain closed to the public are baseball/softball fields, batting cages, gymnasiums, and stadium fields or multi-purpose fields.

Although the stadium is open to public use, there will be rules in place, as the facilities will not be open to host any organized practices or games.

Any sport-sponsored or fee-based training will also not be permitted to take place on the grounds.

People will not be able to bring their pets with them property and all other school board policies will apply during that time as well.

All facilities and campuses will be opened at 6 p.m. on the designated Wednesdays and locked at 8 p.m.

Having the facilities open from 6-8 p.m. will also give people time to get home from work and still have time to use the facilities, while also being late in the day so that the heat is not as overwhelming.

The high schools where facilities will be opened will be Ponte Vedra, Nease, Bartram Trail, Beachside, Creekside, Tocoi Creek, St. Augustine and Pedro Menendez.



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Teacher gets SPACE scholarship

Shannon Johnson, science teacher at Episcopal School of Jacksonville, Beaches Campus, has received the Space 2023 Scholarship to attend the Space Port Area Conference for Educators at NASA this summer. The scholarship was awarded to only 11 educators in the state of Florida and was provided by the Astronaut Memorial Foundation and Florida Space Grant Consortium.

The Space Port Area Conference for Educators (SPACE) aims to serve teachers from across the nation by providing professional development opportunities and high-quality STEM instructional resources. Attending educators spend three days at The Center for Space Education developing curriculum and forming relationships. Educators will be given the opportunity to be immersed in the operations of Kennedy Space Center - including keynote sessions with astronauts,

launch directors and other space icons, as well as behind-the-scene tours of Space Port Operations.

"I am thrilled that I will be given the opportunity to learn about current and past space travel directly from NASA astronauts, launch directors and other NASA educators," said Johnson. "This is a once-in-a-lifetime experience that I will benefit greatly from and will be able to share with my students when we return to school in the fall. I am most excited about the following opportunities: getting to fly over the Space Florida Launch and Landing Facility and runway, the opportunity to tour behind-the-scene areas of Kennedy Space Center, participating in a STEM class that will take me through the process of space-settlement design and also getting to build a Neutral Buoyancy Lab virtual reality model and underwater research habitat."

It is going to take generations for the communities to be rebuilt, jobs to be created and for lives to get back to normal, whatever that new normal is going to look like. For the people of Turkey, their lives have changed and will never be the same.



I understand you are matching the first \$100,000 of the donations. How will donations to the relief fund be used to help those impacted by the earthquakes?

It will go towards building a school or a health care facility. My funds will be deployed alongside the donations we collect. I intend to dedicate more funding each year in efforts to continue rebuilding the desperately needed facilities.

Rotary duck race continues building tradition

The Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra held its annual Rubber Duck Race, which serves as the community organization's largest fundraiser each year, and the result was 3,000 rubber ducks being dumped from a front loaded from the Palm Valley Bridge into the Intracoastal Waterway.

Money raised from this year's event went toward four beneficiaries, which included the Rotary Club Foundation, Learn to Read St. Johns, Bit of Faith Ranch in Ponte Vedra and Port in the Storm in St. Augustine.

"The duck race has been going on for close to a decade now, but the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra took things over about five years ago," said Gary Smith, who served as chairperson of this year's duck race. "We raise about \$20,000 to \$25,000 annually."

According to Smith, the duck race had run in the lazy river at Nocatee Splash Park, but this year marked the third since making the venue change and dropping the ducks off the Palm Valley Bridge and into the Intracoastal Waterway.

"We figured it would be a much more exciting way to go about it, but it also takes a lot to put this thing together, with a lot of people helping out along the way," Smith said. "It takes a lot of people from our Rotary Club to help out. We started planning this event back in October."

Due to the continued growth of the event, Smith and the Rotary Club already have their focus set on reaching a minimum of \$50,000 raised next year.

"This is the premier event for our Rotary Club and it's only going to get bigger and bigger," Smith said. "There are a lot of duck race drops throughout the country that are huge and we're aspiring to be there, because we want to raise as much money as we can for all these good causes."

Another way the event gives back is not only through the money it raises from selling rubber ducks, but also by coordinating with Ponte Vedra High School's National Honor Society students, who help in the efforts to sell ducks and get the word out in the months leading up.

"They raised thousands of dollars this year in duck sales," Bob Wiltfong, Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra president, said. "Every time we checked the sales, there was always at least \$35 from a Ponte Vedra High School supporter, so they did phenomenal this year and we couldn't have done it without them and the next generation getting on board."

The event looks from the outside like a large-scale production, but there is even more behind the scenes that goes in to making it a fun event for the entire family.

"That is a huge element, but we also had to get all the permitting and permissions to do this," Wiltfong said. "You even have to measure tides to make sure the tide is going the right way," Wiltfong said. "It's quite the undertaking, but totally worth it."

The top prize to the winning duck once again this year was two roundtrip tickets by Southwest Airlines to any location in the United States.

No rubber ducks were left behind as a swarm of kayakers and boaters circled to corral each of the ducks from the water at the end of the event.

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Elected officials give update on issues


Members of the community had an opportunity to hear directly from elected leaders Friday, May 19, during the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce Legislative Breakfast. The event was held at Embassy Suites by Hilton St. Augustine Beach Oceanfront Resort.

Panelists included state Rep. Cyndi Stevenson, County Commissioner Christian Whitehurst, St. Augustine Mayor Nancy Sikes-Kline and St. Augustine Beach Mayor Don Samora. State Sen. Travis Hutson was invited but could not attend.

Whitehurst said that, among the county's many needs, none is greater than transportation and infrastructure. Protection for natural environmental resources and workforce housing were also top concerns.

Addressing housing, Whitehurst emphasized that members of an "essential workforce" — he mentioned nurses, firefighters, law enforcement and teachers — need a place to live. For many workers, the costs of housing and rent in St. Johns County are prohibitive.

Whitehurst said that, three days before this year's legislative session, the county held a transportation summit where staff laid out the county's needs before Hutson, Stevenson and U.S. Rep. John Rutherford. The effort bore fruit. This year, with

elected officials going to bat for the county, the Legislature provided \$59 million for transportation and coastal protection.

About \$15 million of that would go toward an extension of County Road 2209 to International Golf parkway from Silverleaf Parkway. This route, when complete, would take pressure off U.S. 1 and I-95.

According to Whitehurst, the county also received \$25 million to construct an engineered beach with a vegetative dune system at North Ponte Vedra Beach to protect it from coastal storms.

He said he is sometimes asked why the county keeps putting sand back on the beach only to have it washed away. His response: The financial impact of no renourishing the beach would be in the millions, in part due to lost property values and mitigation of saltwater intrusion into freshwater areas.

Funding has also been allocated to the county for a change at the intersection of U.S. 1 and County Road 210A to eliminate a high-risk railroad crossing. The state has committed \$6 million and that makes the county eligible to apply for a \$22 million Federal Railroad Crossing Elimination Grant.

Another \$6 million will fund improvements to State Road A1A intersections.

"Anybody who travels along A1A understands that the road has been congested for many, many years," Whitehurst said. "These intersection improvements will certainly improve traffic flow through and around that area."

In addition, \$2 million will go to reconstruction and signalization of the intersection of Pine Island Road and U.S. 1.

Sikes-Kline reminded attendees that St. Augustine City Manager John Regan will retire June 2. He and his replacement, David Birchim, were in attendance at the Chamber breakfast.

Sikes-Kline also addressed homelessness and panhandling in the city. She assured attendees that St. Augustine is trying to address the problem, though in some cases its hands are tied.

"It's a deeply rooted problem in our society right now," she said.

She said the city is working on creating a drop-in center that would give homeless people a place to go.

The city is also looking at the possibility of creating an area of affordable housing off Holmes Boulevard.

Samora spoke about short-term rentals in his city and the possibility of putting utilities underground.

Stevenson described newly passed legislation that requires golf cart operators under the age of 18 to have a learner's permit or driver's license when on public roads. Those over 18 will also need some form of photo ID, though they won't need a driver's license.

She listed some other actions taken during this year's session: increased funding for education, increased parental choice opportunities through voucher systems, increased health care funding and more than \$250 million for affordable housing programs.

In addition, she noted that the state allocated \$4 billion to hurricane recovery.

MARKET WATCH Forging ahead under challenging circumstances

The mortgage industry is on the front line of the economy. Topics such as inflation, consumer price index (CPI), interest rates, affordability, first-time homebuyers and supply and demand are discussed daily at dinner tables, boardrooms and press conferences. There remains significant uncertainty for consumers, investors and businesses leaders, with everyone wondering what the future holds for our national and local economies, and how economic changes will impact their future plans.

Many residents of Ponte Vedra Beach and St. Johns County are seeing positive signs in our local economy and real estate market. We hosted a successful THE PLAYERS Championship golf tournament again this year; another PGA building is rising on Palm Valley Road; and we are seeing land, even close to A1A, being used for new single-family detached homes. Additionally, Nocatee continues expanding outwards with commercial and residential developments east to the Intracoastal Waterway, west to U.S. 1, and south towards Palencia.

This is not to say that challenges do not exist. While new apartments have been built in areas like Nocatee, the cost of home ownership is too expensive for many first-time homebuyers. Especially given rising prices and interest rates, purchasing in the local Ponte Vedra Beach market is a challenge.

In this time of uncertainty, it is helpful to compare the year over year 2023 April new home sales statistics for Duval and St. Johns counties.

• Duval county April year over year sales were down 21% at 1,289, compared to 1,646 last year*

• St. Johns County April year-overyear sales were down 17.5% at 662, compared to 802 last year**



This local data certainly follows the state and nationwide trends. After seven Federal Funds rate increases in 2022, recent data shows existing April year-over-year home sales statewide are down 20.5% year over year, which is 3% higher than St. Johns County and 1% lower than Duval County***, indicating that St. Johns County is faring better amid than its larger neigh-





I think it's reasonably apparent that these Jaguars are not those Jaguars.

And by these Jaguars I mean that bunch that looked like those Jaguars for most of the first nine weeks of the 2022 season but found traction in November when quarterback Trevor Lawrence found his NFL form in come-frombehind wins against the Raiders, Ravens and Cowboys.

There is an expectation that these Jaguars will win the AFC South. Those Jaguars talked about competing for the division title in years past but lacked in enough areas that what they were really talking about was getting lucky.

There is an expectation that these Jaguars will contend with the Bills, Chargers and Bengals and perhaps find a way past Patrick Mahomes and the Chiefs.

There is an expectation that these Jaguars will from now on be one of the best teams in the NFL and not those Jaguars who always seemed to be at the forefront of free agent spending and the top five picks of the draft every spring.

That change is already underway. The Jaguars had very little choice in allowing free agents such as right tackle Jawaan Taylor and edge rusher Arden Key to leave this spring, which has never really happened for this franchise but is part of the free agent lifecycle. The presence of Lawrence and the best free agent classes in team history in 2021 and 2022 set up 2023 to be a more moderate process in Jacksonville. You'll take it when you have Christian Kirk, Zay Jones and Evan Engram in your line-up ... all three arrived in 2022.

The Jaguars 2023 NFL Draft Class is the best indicator of where the franchise actually is. Picking No. 24 and outside the top 10 picks for the first time since 2018 they played the long game waiting to see how the board would unfold and then when it fell their way, they played it even longer. General Manager Trent Baalke moved back to No. 25 with the New York Giants and then again to No. 27 with the Buffalo Bills and still ended up with offensive tackle Anton Harrison. They loved the player and the person, and it obviously filled a critical need with the loss of Taylor to Kansas City. As important they added more draft picks, which helped them fill out their roster with guys they wanted in Jacksonville.

On days two and three of the draft they plowed forward with a franchise record 13 picks and found other future starters in tight end Brenton Strange from Penn State and safety Antonio Johnson from Texas A&M.

They also added players who will fill a role in running back Tank Bigsby from Auburn, edge rusher Yasir Abdullah from Louisville, defensive lineman Tyler Lacey from Oklahoma State and slot receiver Parker Washington from Penn State.

Look, that's a good draft haul all by itself, not sexy, but solid. The 2021 class that added Lawrence, running back Travis Etienne, cornerback Tyson Campbell and left tackle Walker Little was the sexy class. Everything now is to build around that foundation and this 2023 class accomplishes that mission.

Baalke and head coach Doug Pederson weren't finished though, taking flyers on six more players including offensive tackle Cooper Hodges from Appalachian State who will move inside and play guard, cornerback Christian Braswell from Rutgers and Derrick Parrish who played defensive end at Houston but will transition to fullback in Pederson's scheme.

These Jaguars added a lot of quality football players in last month's draft. Is it a star-studded class? Probably not. Let's face it, few are that don't add a quarterback. But it has a few starters, a few role players and a few swings for the fence and that's what these Jaguars will attempt to do every spring as long as they have their franchise quarterback.

It's too early to tell what this class will be but it sure looks like it will offer depth across the roster, which builds the competition level on the field and makes a team better.

As the school year comes to close, it is such fun to celebrate the hard work of our students, faculty, staff, volunteers, community and business partners and school leaders! Significant effort goes into making each school year successful, and we are incredibly fortunate to be a part of a community that values education.

Our mission in the St. Johns County School District is to inspire good character and a passion for lifelong learning in all students, creating educated and caring contributors to the world. It is always exciting to see that mission unfold, as our students cross the graduation stage to begin the next chapter in their journey.

Of course, in a large school district

such as ours that serves students from preschool through postsecondary education, there will always be challenges. Yet we continue to maintain a culture of continuous improvement as we seek opportunities for innovation. We know we will not always get every situation right, but we remain committed and focused on our mission — our students.

An example of this is a new partnership our school district's Early Childhood Services department has formed with First Coast Technical College's (FCTC) Early Childhood Services post-secondary program. Through this partnership, our youngest students will receive enhanced learning opportunities, as will our future educators.

The FCTC campus has long hosted the Tech Tots PreK childcare program, whereby secondary school students enrolled in the college's Early Childhood Education program worked with Tech Tots children. Over the past few years, however, the Tech Tots program has experienced declining enrollment. To provide a deeper and richer experience for our secondary students and to better serve the students in our community, the school district added two classrooms: a Head Start class serving students from lower socioeconomic backgrounds and an Exceptional Student Education (ESE) Intensive Support classroom.

As a result, FCTC students now have a hands-on learning laboratory that provides three different environments: Tech Tots for child care, Head Start for community-based education and ESE for children with disabilities and special needs.

Moving forward, there are plans

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to expand the size and scope of this program. This will include offering after-care hours, parent education classes and on-site family engagement opportunities. Future plans also include increasing programming to provide St. Augustine High School Career Academy students enrolled in the Teaching Academy with the opportunity to engage in authentic and meaningful experiences within the three different types of classroom environments.

In other FCTC news, the college recently hosted an Inaugural Transition Services Fair, with 35 local vendors and agencies that provide services and support to individuals with disabilities. More than 200 people attended the fair, where students and families were able to ask questions and learn about the different programs and available community resources.

School accreditation

In addition to completing the 2022-23 school year and planning for the 2023-24 school year, our school district has completed the accreditation process that occurs every five years. We were pleased with the initial results. This summer, we will take a deep dive into the full report and digest the feedback that was shared in the many stakeholder group sessions. This information will assist us in moving forward with our strategic planning process over the next several months.

Trip to Greece, Jerusalem proves life changing

We're the three amigos — Dr Deb Blanton, Kelley Bost and Joe Bryant. We just completed a fabulous trip that was purchased at the silent auction at The Celebration of the Arts annual fund raiser put on by the First Coast Cultural Center.

Our travels first took us to Jerusalem. A challenging six-hour guided walking tour inside the walls of the "Old City of Jerusalem" brought history to life and introduced us to the delicious "street food" that is a staple.

Freshly made daily and served family style: hummus, cucumber, tomatoes, tahini, falafel, olives, Shawarma (rotisserie lamb or beef wrapped with vegetables in warm bread). Our Jewish tour guide's depth of knowledge regarding world history, the influence of Jesus, the USA and all religions of the region was quite impressive and at 75 years old, his ability to walk for six hours up and down the uneven streets was equally impressive.

A car ride tour to the Sea of Galilee,

Capernaum, Magdala the JordanRiver and Nazareth took two-and-a-half hours through the desert. It was interesting to learn the "old" roads and aqueducts built by the Romans are still being used today.

Jerusalem (Old and New cities) is 49 square miles with a population of 1,140,000. The land is hilly, and everywhere you look, there are multi-story buildings, all looking alike, that house the population.

On our last evening we were in search of a nice glass of wine and made our way to the Waldorf Astoria, which was a treat. While sipping, we talked about how this trip was life changing. And the ability to travel now feels like a gift.

On to the Greek Isles, first starting in beautiful, peaceful Santorini. The Villa Lilium is at the top of the mountain overlooking the majestic views of other islands and the Aegean Sea. Life in Santorini is all about slowing down, daily consumption of fresh organic food (including eggs, orange juice, seafood, pasta, great local wine), enjoying people and reflecting on life.

We quickly adapted and allowed our new friend, Elisa, to advise us. A sunset catamaran tour and a tour of the oldest winery on the island and many hours of pool and hot tub with that view was just perfect. There is little rain in Santorini. The grape vines are small and low to the ground. The vines absorb water from the salt air. The rocky ground is volcanic soil. The wine is light, refreshing and has slight mineral undertones. Delicious!

As we traveled on, we found the friendly people, fresh food and good wine was also abundant in Mykonos, Crete and Athens. Mykonos and Santorin are similar in architecture with interesting buildings painted white with blue or gray trim. Mykonos has a vibrant night life. The locals in Mykonos and Athens had many questions about the USA and expressed their desire to visit.


In Athens, Hotel Electra has a beautiful view of the Acropolis from their world-class restaurant on the top floor. We enjoyed fresh dishes, such as squid ink pasta with octopus and beef cheeks from the local beef farm. We booked a bus/walking tour of many sites including the Acropolis, Athens National Museum, Olympic Stadium, the Athens library and two of the oldest learning institutions in Athens.

The tour guide explained that Athens, being the first known democracy in the world (introduced in 6 B.C.), was the example used by our founding fathers to create our system of democracy. Also, the disciplines of philosophy, high learning, healthy lifestyle, exploring new ideas and diplomacy were incorporated early on and are still encouraged today. Paul was able to introduce Christianity in Athens during his travels because the Athens way of life explored new ideas openly.

It was so wonderful to travel again and talk to people from all over the world. There was very little talk of politics or any subject that is divisive. Everyone was happy to be exploring the world and grateful to be past the COVID pandemic. It really felt like shutting a door behind you and walking into a happier place.

Britten and Jay Shea were over the moon when they learned they were pregnant with their first child. It also was important to them to choose a Baptist doctor to have easy access to Wolfson Children's Hospital. That foresight is something Britten and Jay are thankful for to this day.

The final trimester of Britten's pregnancy found her dealing with high blood pressure. Weekly blood pressure checks revealed her amniotic fluid levels were dropping rapidly. Unable to bring the fluid back to a safe level, doctors knew that labor should be induced immediately. On Nov. 10, 2020, Crew was born four weeks early.

Shortly after birth, the attentive team in the newborn nursery heard Crew making unusual noises and discovered that the baby was born with an underdeveloped lung that had filled with fluid. Unable to breathe

dren's hospital in Florida and the only children's hospital between Orlando and Atlanta, one of the fastest-growing regions in the country. With specialty centers located as far as Daytona, Tallahassee, Valdosta and Brunswick, getting children the care they need often involves transporting them to Jacksonville.





Ambling through the warm, sunfilled garden this morning, I felt the dew setting around me with the fragrance of fresh tomatoes and the tacky feel of cucumbers hovering around the towering sunflowers surrounding me. These incredible sensations made me ponder something special and unique in the excellent flavor combinations that encompassed me. I immediately began to think of the light and refreshing traditional Italian treat of bruschetta.

Italy claims it as their bruschetta, this delicate and tasty pleasure dates back to the Roman Empire. Historically it was bread made with no salt, a day old, and doused with the oil from olive farmers to test the quality of their oils. And thus, we have bruschetta! Over time the Italians adapted it into their own, rubbed in fresh garlic and topped the crusty bread with an array of cured meats, or vegetables and fresh herbs.

With evolution still kicking in, we here in America tend to toast

whatever bread we can find and top it with marinated tomatoes, garlic, basil and some delicious cheese, such as what I prefer, a delectable burrata. I'm here to take it to an even more elevated state. Let's forget the bread and cheese all together, add some fresh garden cucumbers, and use this historical dish in any way we see fit! Well, maybe not the burrata!

From a simple gift as an amuse bouche to a tasting spoon. To the topping of your favorite sea swimmer, lavishly covering a delightful chard yard bird, or even toss it with your favorite pasta Alfredo. This versatile recipe can fill you with tremendous joy and a sense of summertime and might even intrigue your understanding of some history.

So, with no haste, run out, scoop up your ingredients from your local farmers and let's make it for whatever summertime occasion it calls for.

As the French say, Bon appetite! And as always from Taste Catering and Barn Yard Farms, I wish you well, and God bless! **Summertime Bruschetta**

Yields approximately 5 cups

- 10 medium Roma tomatoes
- 1/2 seedless cucumber
- 2 large garlic cloves, peeled
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1/2 cup aged balsamic vinegar
- 2 oz Barn Yard Farms Micro Basil
- Fresh cracked sea salt and cracked black pepper to taste.
- Top off with balsamic reduction drizzle to make it even more amazing!

Combine all ingredients in a large bowl. Slice Roma tomatoes 1/4 inch thick, then medium dice

- Slice cucumbers 1/4 inch thick and then medium dice
 - Press the garlic or fine dice. Add olive oil.
 - Add balsamic.

Rough chop micro basil, saving some, whole, for garnish.

Salt and pepper to taste

Toss well, cover and refrigerate for 24 hours.

Hate Ends Now: The Cattle Car Experience

As my colleague and I drove up to the LJD Jewish Family and Community Services parking lot, my stomach churned as I saw the cattle car from a distance. I wasn't sure exactly what to expect — only an innate feeling that it would be something I would never forget. Stepping inside, the very first thing I noticed was the black footprints painted onto the wood beneath me — a variety of sizes — ones that matched mine and ones that would have matched my 5-year-old daughter. The Shadowlight representative gave us a short introduction explaining this was an exact replica of the cattle cars which were used by Nazis to shuttle Jews to concentration camps, at 100 people per car. I looked around and counted the mere 20-something of us that were currently cramped into the space and shuddered at the thought. The representative closed the door behind us, and the interior darkened even in the daytime, with only tiny slivers of light making their way

through the cracks.

As the video started, I began to understand why this is described as a "fully immersive" experience. The images are projected all around you, covering and moving life-like along every wall of the car — in such a way that you feel right in the middle of these men, women, children and babies and right in the middle of the fear and violence and pain they suffered. If a picture is worth a thousand words, this experience was worth an entire history book.

The film itself follows the stories of two survivors, Hedy and Nate.

"The boxcar plays heavily in my mind because that's the transition from being a human being to becoming a number which they could dispose of at their own will," a now-elderly Nate shared in his interview.

I found it impossible not to cry for Hedy as she recounted being separated from her mother upon reaching Auschwitz, looking into her eyes for what would be the final time. None of her family survived the concentration camps, but she did. In fact, we learned, she was there on-site touring with the exhibit, in her 90s, willing to be loud and brave in sharing her horrific experiences for the sake of making sure that history is never repeated.

At that moment, I reflected honestly on times in my life, as someone who attended both Protestant grade school and a public university, when I knew I was witnessing antisemitism right in front of me. From the time I shrugged off that "joke" involving Jewish tropes by a high school friend, to the time I once listened to a college professor passively propagate an anti-Jewish conspiracy theory and wondered if anyone was going to say anything ... and at that moment, I felt ashamed — ashamed that I hadn't always been loud and brave in the face of bigotry and ashamed that I hadn't always realized that this is my fight, too.

The greatest value that I have gained from my education and career in nonprofit and social justice is that standing up to hatred and bias in any form is everyone's fight — even more so for those who enjoy the privilege of being the majority — if we are to ensure that Hedy's mission is honored. Working for the Jewish Federation & Foundation for the past four years, I've become much more acquainted with Jewish life than I was prior; I've been very lucky to be invited to many Shabbat dinners, and I now make it a point to try to do my daily mitzvah.

However, I believe of far more importance to being the kind of ally that I hope to be, lies in what I teach my daughter as she grows up. While she is still a bit young to learn about the atrocities of the Holocaust, I teach her about acceptance and tolerance and try to introduce her to different beliefs and traditions in the little ways that she can grasp thus far. This past winter, our family lit the menorah, taking the opportunity to teach the kids that Chanukah is not actually "Jewish Christmas," but actually a completely unrelated celebration involving the Maccabees and the miracle of oil that never ran out. But as she gets older, I can promise that she will be taught the exact truth about what happened to Hedy and Nate, and how it is imperative that she be part of a better future that takes part in never forgetting so that it can never happen again.

bor Duval and the state during this slowdown.

Even with today's market challenging homebuyers, Ponte Vedra Beach and St. Johns remain attractive. With a state-leading public school system, low crime rates and proximity to beaches, we are poised to weather these slower times well and see activity pick up as the economy shifts. Also, during this time, we are seeing the higher-priced beach home market along the coastline remaining active.

Some residential mortgage analysts expect interest rates to moderate and begin dropping this year. Freddie Mac reports a current interest rates average of 6.39%, which is down from 7.08% on November 10, 2022, a significant drop in six months that many hope will continue****.

An encouraging, related update is the decline in the nation's inflation rate to 4.93% in April*****, which was at its lowest level since April 2021. High inflation was the impetus for the rising interest rate path the Federal Reserve began travelling last year.

In summary, like markets across the nation, the Ponte Vedra Beach real estate market has slowed, albeit less than our neighbors year over year. While interest rates and inflation do remain high, we all continue to watch for indications that the Federal Reserve will taper off rate increases, as this will contribute to the lowering of mortgage interest rates. This will be an important marker for anyone looking to buy or sell: from first-time homebuyers to current home owners who want to move but feel "stuck" knowing that purchasing a new home means incurring a much higher interest rate than their current home. While uncertain economic circumstances persist, Ponte Vedra Beach, and St. Johns counties are faring better than others and remain exceptional areas to live, work, and thrive.



Scout project revives church narthex with new tables

Boy Scout Jake Hilley of Troop 277 came to the rescue of Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Ponte Vedra Beach when he approached them to ask about any project he could take on, to reach his Eagle Scout rank. The answer: tables.

The little church that was once a stable, has been using picnic tables in its narthex that were also created by Boy Scouts more than a decade ago. They were functional and had multiple uses during its Pumpkin Patch, but many were falling apart. Build your portfolio on a solid foundation

Asset allocation can be to investment planning what the foundation is to a house or the chassis is to a car. It's what everything else is built upon. And just as important as constructing a house on a firm foundation, having the right asset allocation can be vital to helping you work toward your financial goals.

Although the name may sound intimidating, asset allocation is just a technical term for a rather simple concept. It's merely how your portfolio is divided up among different types of investments, such as stocks, bonds and what are called "cash alternatives."

How it works

Using asset allocation to build a portfolio designed to help you reach your longterm goals requires taking three primary factors into consideration:

Goals. These are simply what you're investing to achieve. For many of us, a major goal is to enjoy a financially secure retirement. If you have younger children or grandchildren, helping them afford higher education without building a mountain of debt is likely another goal. Or maybe you'd also like to make a luxury purchase — such as buying a vacation home or dream car or taking an exotic vacation — down the road.

Time horizon. One reason why knowing your goals is important is because it helps determine your time horizon (how long you have until you need to tap into your investments). If you're 28, for example, and want to retire at 68, your time horizon is 40 years. Simple as that.

Risk tolerance. Your risk tolerance is the amount of volatility in your portfolio's value you're comfortable with. If you find you can't sleep because you're worried about your investments — especially when there's market volatility — you probably need to adjust your asset allocation to suit your risk tolerance.

Putting the pieces together

With those factors in hand, you can begin to piece your asset allocation together. The primary building blocks, at least to begin with, are likely to include: **Stocks.** Historically, stocks have offered attractive returns, but along with those returns, there have also been periods of volatility. If you're young, you generally have a long-time horizon especially when it comes to retirement. That may allow you to have a larger allocation to stocks because you have longer to ride out any short-term market volatility that occurs.

Bonds. One reason investors like bonds in a portfolio is because their prices have historically been relatively stable. By owning bonds, an investor's aim may be to help manage his or her portfolio's overall value when there's volatility in the stock market. The larger the proportion of bonds, the more steady

the portfolio's overall value should remain. Keep in mind, however, that bonds' returns have been significantly less than stocks.

Cash alternatives. These are relatively lower-risk, lower-return investments. On the upside, they can be easily be converted into cash when it's needed. On the downside, their returns may not even keep up with inflation.


Of course, there are many other investments to consider, many with varying degrees of historical risk vs. return. Just remember that you should intend for each type of investment to play a particular role, such as providing the potential for Contributed photos

growth or income or stability, in your overall allocation, and you need to understand the risks involved.

Once you've decided on the types of investments to include, you need to determine how much of each is appropriate. If you're looking to grow your investments' value, you'll likely have a larger stock allocation and a smaller one for bonds. The result would be a portfolio with more potential volatility than one with a larger proportion of bonds. You should ask yourself if that's a trade-off you're comfortable with.

Get help if you need it

Although asset allocation is a relatively simple concept, you can see it has lots of "moving parts." That's one reason why many investors opt to work with



a professional financial advisor. If you decide to seek help, look for an advisor who will first get to know you and then help create an investment plan that's built around (what else?) an appropriate asset allocation.

Asset allocation cannot eliminate the risk of fluctuating prices and uncertain returns.

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
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Beaches Fine Arts Series to present Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra on May 26


"Antonio Jones Jr. (Tony), is the third generation of Jones'," said Walker. "He was raised by his mixed-race father who was a Union Army officer who passed for white and his mother who was white. His mother who was from Georgia was a teacher at the Penn School. Tony went to the Penn School and became very educated and got into Harvard. But after going to Harvard for a bit, he decided he wanted to become an artist and dropped out of Harvard and headed to Paris. He didn't have much luck and returned to Georgia and met the daughter of a plantation owner and they fell in love."

That didn't sit well with the community because they were a mixed-race couple.

"People didn't like that and they had a lot of problems," Walker said. "The Ku Klux Klan tried to kill him, but he escaped and they ran off to Paris so he could try to establish himself as an artist. That is where this book picks up."

In order to escape the bigotry of the South, as a character in the prologue of the book says, they were headed to the "new old world."

Walker's book, "When the Old World Was New," allows the readers to take a peek inside Paris in the 1900s as the streets rumble with construction and dirt swirls in the air in preparation for the 1900 Paris Exposition as well as the excitement of the characters interacting with new inventions such as electricity, electric lights, steam locomotives, Ferris wheels, telephones, motor cars, moving sidewalks and more.





The exposition also paved the way for many artists such as Monet and Matisse, to have the opportunity to make a name for themselves by entering work into the exhibitions and contests, so it was a perfect opportunity for the main character Tony to arrive and stake his claim.

Tony's wife, Jackie, was an actress but wasn't finding opportunities in Paris because she couldn't speak French, so she traveled to London to try to continue her stage acting there and she becomes quite successful. While she is gone, Tony meets a woman named Madame Goldman who becomes his benefactor and helps launch his career.

According to Walker, many twists and turns transpire throughout the book that causes the reader to laugh out loud or say "I knew it!" "When the Old World Was New" is filled with colorful characters with deep pockets and deep secrets, some of which are not revealed until the very end.

The book has a great deal of French in it, but the response from the other characters usually makes it easy to understand what was said and if not, readers might learn a little French in the process.

Walker spent time in France several times, but most recently from September 2021 to April 2022 absorbing the culture and language.

"So, I spent seven months in the South of France," he said. "I got to know my landlady, who was American, pretty well. She married a Frenchmen and raised her two children there."

His previous landlady runs a book club in France once a month and recently she had some exciting news for him.

"She sent me an email saying 'When the Old World Was New' is in all the book stores and all her friends are read-

Sharks win school's first team track and field state title

Lebowitz, Jackson, Madaffari win individual golds

The Florida high school track and field season concluded last weekend at the University of North Florida's Hodges Stadium and the Ponte Vedra Sharks boys' team won the state championship withstanding a late charge from Miami Belen Jesuit Prep and Miami Northwestern.

The state championship meet was the culmination of a season that could be described as both impressive and improbable; it marked the first track and field state championship in school history and the first for any St. Johns County team in a decade.

The boys' path to a team championship was predicated on strong performances in the field events, and that was where the Sharks proved dominant.

Led by senior co-captain Nathan Lebowitz, the Sharks scored 48 points in the field events – enough points alone to secure the championship without scoring a single point in the running events.

The competition began with the boys shot put and the Sharks struck early. Junior Jake Guarnera led the charge finishing second with a school and personal record of 58 feet 2 inches, which beat his previous record by nearly seven feet.

He was followed by Lebowitz, who also had a personal record with a throw of 56 feet 9 inches to finish in 3rd place and senior Layne Swafford finished 6th with a throw of 53 feet.



The Sharks' three individual gold medalists included Bella Madaffari in girls javelin, Nathan Lebowitz in boys discus, and Vinny Jackson in boys javelin.

Junior javelin thrower Vinny Jackson, who was seeded third entering the meet, unleashed an enormous throw of 187 feet on his very first attempt to secure the gold medal for the event and set both personal and school records in the process.

In the discus, Lebowitz successfully defended his 2022 state championship with a throw of 183 feet 10 inches.

The Sharks added points in the pole vault with senior Landen Scott earning 3rd place with a vault of 13 feet 9.5 inches, followed by senior Henry Gainer finishing fifth with the same height and junior Nick Desanto placing eighth with a jump of 13 feet 3 inches.

As the action turned to the track, the Sharks scored in the first event with the team of Ricky Circelli, Grant Doherty, Davis Brown and Colby Green finishing with a school record time of 7:59.72 for fifth place in the 4x800 meter relay.

The only other Shark to reach the podium in the track portion was senior Wyatt Rogers finishing eighth in the 400-meter hurdles with a time of 56.35 seconds.

The lady Sharks also had success at the meet and were headlined with junior Bella Madaffari, won the state championship with a javelin throw of 116 feet 8 inches.

Also earning all-state honors were two relay teams, as the 4x800 team of Lily Darnell, Sofia Bushkell, Hilaree Vega and Daisy Ross finished eighth with a time of 9:41.20 and the 4x400 team of Sasha Crowe, Darnell, Maya Richards and Mia Chigounis crossing the line is a school record time of 3:58.09 and also finishing eighth.

Both teams are coached by Zane Guile, who is completing his ninth year as head coach of the Sharks.

"We have a group that had a dream to win a state championship this year," Guile said. "The dedication, hard work and selflessness exhibited by this group was on display all season. We tell our athletes that 'yesterday's greatness is today's average,' and try to inspire them to achieve their very best on the track and in life. The athletes that buy into our system very often achieve outstanding results.

PVHS athletic director Michael Harrison also commented on the season, "I'm excited for the accomplishments of this team. Coach Guile and coach Circelli have created a team environment that reflects the image we expect of all our athletes. Winning is great, but demonstrating great character and sportsmanship is the ultimate compliment I can give these great student athletes."


